

NEW YORK, Sept. 12 -- It is rapidly becoming apparent that Connie Mack, the noted Philadelphian, in addition to being charged with winning another pennant and another world's series, which seems just as likely at this time, will also be charged with causing quite an unlooked for financial depression in the American league.
