Teachers of South Omaha Ask Same Pay as Those of Omaha

Shortening of the school year two weeks has meant an increase in pay for Omaha school teachers and a decrease for the South Omaha teachers. The Board of Education of Omaha, after shortening the year, permitted the salary schedule to remain unchanged. In South Omaha the teachers' salaries were proportionately reduced when the year was shortened.

The South Omaha teachers are now attempting to force the school authorities to reconsider the salary-reduction order and are using Omaha's action as an argument.

Omaha teachers are paid by the year in nine payments. The minimum is \$50 a year, which automatically increases by \$5 a year until it reaches the maximum of \$1,000. The South Omaha salary schedule is slightly under Omaha.

The janitor in the Omaha schools, although hired and paid by the month, will also receive the benefit of the shortened school year, for they will be employed the entire year at the same salary. All janitors are ordinarily kept working during the summer vacation months.

The Omaha schools will close June 4 unless there are unavoidable lapses, when all schools will be dismissed, in which case the lost time will be added to the end of the year.

David Cole Finds British Imbued With War Spirit

David Cole is home from Europe, and, while he was not in the war zone, he was in touch with the excitement incident to the conflict that is being waged. Mr. Cole returned to Omaha Saturday and was gone just three months to a day. He reached London July 26 and sailed for home August 22, in the meantime having toured England and Scotland, but did not get over on the continent. Said Mr. Cole:

"Everywhere in England and Scotland the war was the one topic that was always up for discussion and everywhere the opinion prevails that in the end Germany will be whipped, but as yet no one seems to have ventured an opinion as to what the settlement will be."

"I was surprised to see the spirit of patriotism that seemed to have possession of the people of England. They seemed to feel it a duty and a privilege to enlist and rush off to war to fight."

Five Thousand to Improve Municipal Beach at Carter's

Five thousand dollars for improvements at the municipal bath house at Carter lake will be set aside by the city council when the next annual budget is prepared in January, according to City Commissioner Butler of the department of finances and accounts.

The municipal bath house, tried for the first time this year, under the supervision of Park Commissioner J. R. Hummel, was a great success, as many as 500 men, women and children patronizing it in one evening.

Offerman Bros. Get Paving Contract

Offerman Bros., contractors, were low bidders for the job of resurfacing the granite block pavement on Military avenue from Clifton Hill to Benson. The contract will be let Saturday.

A bid of 68 cents per lineal foot and thirty days' time for completion of the job, was made by the low bidder. Nothing was done with the falling proposition of Sheriff McShane, which will be considered later.

Miss Dorman Arrives For Anti Campaign

Miss Marjorie Dorman of New York has arrived in Omaha to begin a campaign of public speaking against woman suffrage. She speaks under the auspices of the National Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage. Mrs. J. W. Crumpecker has arranged for Miss Dorman to make a number of addresses in the eastern part of the state. These two women will hold meetings at Blair, Plattsmouth, York and other cities.

DEFENDS ACTION FOR NOT PAYING THE RENT

Asserting that she moved from the house at 2704 Seward street, owned by Miss Ella Brackin, because poison, scattered by the latter around the premises for the purpose of killing sparrows, was a menace to the lives of her three little girls, Mrs. Alice Glenn successfully defended an action in county court, brought by Miss Brackin, to collect \$32 rent money, which she claimed was lost through Mrs. Glenn's sudden departure in the middle of the month.

SOUTH OMAHAN SERIOUSLY INJURED IN AUTO MIXUP

In an automobile collision at Thirteenth and Missouri Avenue Sunday afternoon, Fritz Gassner, South Omaha, was seriously injured, necessitating his immediate removal to the South Omaha hospital. He was attended by Dr. F. R. Simpson, 231 Binney street, whose machine made up the other half of the collision, was slightly injured.
