**PRISONER'S LOT IS MADE EASIER**  
U. S. Exerts Pressure to Induce Germany to Relax Strict Regulations.  
**INTERCHANGE COMING SOON**  
Soldiers Probably Will Not Be Exchanged, but Noncombatants and Allied Enemies Will Be Moved.  
(Copyright, 1914, by Press Publishing Co.)  
LONDON, Sept. 16.—(Special Cablegram to New York World and Omaha Bee.)—Negotiations now are actively under way looking to an exchange of particulars relating to prisoners of war between England and Germany and eventually to the exchange of the prisoners themselves.  
Through the embassies, legations and consulates here and on the continent, the United States government is sending every effort to facilitate arrangements which will permit Britons in Germany and Germans in England to communicate with their families and friends from the concentration camps, where they are held.  
Under the Hague convention, prisoners of war are civilians and are accorded the right to correspond with relatives—of course, subject to strict censorship by their captors—but hitherto the German authorities have refused captured British subjects the privilege to send messages of any kind homeward, and naturally, the government here is disposed to treat their German prisoners in the same way.  
In a few cases, Germany has communicated to the American consulate for transmission to England the bare fact that such and such Englishmen are incarcerated.  
U. S. Exerts Pressure.  
Pressure exerted by the American government at Berlin, however, shortly told on the kaiser's officials, who now adopt a kinder course toward their British captives, and England will follow suit with regard to Germans held in concentration camps here.  
It is improbable, according to an understanding at the War office here, there will be any exchange of soldier prisoners, but non-combatants and alien enemies in both countries will have an opportunity to return homeward on a reciprocal basis arranged by the United States.

**British Brigadier General Is Killed**  
LONDON, Sept. 16.—Brigadier General Neil Douglas Findlay, Royal artillery, has been killed in action, according to official announcement made tonight.  
Brigadier General Findlay has commanded the First division Royal artillery, of the British army since 1910. He served in the South African war, 1899-1900, was twice mentioned in dispatches for bravery and received the queen's medal. He was born in 1859.

**Austrians Take 100,000 Russians**  
ROME (Via Paris), Sept. 16.—An Austrian official communication received here gives denial to reports of Russian victories and asserts that about 100,000 Russian prisoners and nearly 300 cannons have been captured by the Austrians.

**CORRESPONDENTS AMONG CAPTIVES ENTERING PARIS**  
LONDON, Sept. 16.—The Daily Chronicle's Paris correspondent, under date of Sunday, says:  
"In conformity with the government's rule against correspondents accompanying the allied armies, the following persons were brought into Paris today under arrest:  
Robert Dunn, New York Evening Post; John Reid, attached to an American magazine, and several correspondents of London newspapers. They had asked the British general, Smith-Dorrien's, permission to accompany his column, and General Smith-Dorrien turned them over to the French staff."

**PLAY CHOPIN'S MARCH TO SCARE DOOMED MEN**  
LONDON, Sept. 16.—The Times correspondent in Coulmiers, France, department of Seine-et-Marne, says that the mayor and prosecutor of that town refused absolutely to pay \$20,000 demanded by the Germans as a war levy. They were taken outside the town to be shot, the prosecutor told the correspondent and the Germans played Chopin's funeral march, a last threat to induce them to pay, but the English saved their lives, as a retreat was ordered before the threatened execution could be carried out.

"The surrender of the Austrian army led by General Falk and Von Auffenberg is imminent. The heir to the Austrian throne, Archduke Charles Francis, is with General Dankl's army, which is entirely cut off from communication."

**NEUTRALITY SOUP**  
**"BRITAN CONCOCTION"**  
Nebraskan Arranged "Peace Menu" at Luncheon After Signing of Treaties.  
President Today Will Receive Belgian Commission Coming to Protest Against German War Methods.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—That Emperor William's reply to the informal peace inquiry of the United States is expected within the next few days, is revealed tonight. Optimism in administration circles was heightened today by the signing of treaties between the United States, Great Britain, France, Spain and China.  
**Neutrality Luncheon.**  
The cabinet officers, ambassadors and ministers who witnessed the signing of the treaties were given a luncheon at the University club last night. Secretary Bryan arranged the following menu:  
French omelette Rice croquettes a la Neutralite soup  
Pekin French omelette Corn O'Brien

Spanish omelette American cream  
English mutton chops Oolong tea  
French peas  
President Wilson, it became known today, had made no reply to the messages from Emperor William and President Poincare of France relating to the use of dum-dum bullets. The president tomorrow will receive the commission of Belgian officials who have come from their country especially to lay before him their complaint against alleged violations of civilized warfare in the German invasion.

It is generally understood that the president will make a general statement after the Belgians have seen him, covering their protest as well as the messages from the German emperor and the French president, reiterating the neutrality of the United States.  
**Russians Surprise Opponents by Their Skill and Courage**  
(Copyright, 1914, Press Publishing Co.)  
ROTTERDAM, Sept. 12.—(Via London, Sept. 16.—Special Cablegram to New York World and Omaha Bee.)—Berlin has been surprised by the efficiency of the Russian army. A correspondent in Berlin of the Rotterdam Courant says:  
"The Russians are much better fighters than they were thought by the Germans to be. One hears that on every side. It is said that they have committed some acts of cruelty, but all these things cannot be believed. On the other hand cases where Russians have acted nobly are heard."  
"There is a general feeling, however, that the Russians cannot perform the task they have started on, because of the difficulty of obtaining good supplies. The Russians who were brought to Berlin as prisoners do not give the impression that they had been starving or are not looked after properly."  
"From Austria it is heard that the way the Russians are clothed and shod is splendid; that all alcohol has been forbidden throughout the Russian army, and that a strong hand is being kept on the soldiers."

**Irish Suspensory Measure is Passed**  
LONDON, Sept. 16.—After the unionists had made a formal protest and had left the chamber, the House of Commons this afternoon passed through all its stages the bill introduced by Premier Asquith to suspend the operation of the Irish home rule and the Welsh disestablishment bills. John E. Redmond, the Irish nationalist leader in the House of Commons, expressed the hope that in the intervening period when the Unionists and nationalists were fighting shoulder to shoulder, a new spirit would arise all over Ireland, making a real settlement possible.  
The Welsh and labor leaders expressed their satisfaction with the bill.

**MONTENEGRINS WITH SERBS BEAT AUSTRIANS**  
ROME (Via Paris), Sept. 16.—A dispatch received here from San Giovanni, Algeria, says the Montenegrin troops have joined the Serbians, and fighting under Serbian generals, headed by General Vukotich, have repulsed the Austrians all along the Bosnian frontier.  
"There was fighting Saturday, Sunday and Monday," the dispatch continues, "and the Serbians are now pursuing the enemy. The Austrian casualties amounted to 4,000. Seven hundred men were taken prisoners and another 500 men of Slav nationality deserted the Austrians and joined the Serbians."

**DENIES RIGHT OF CLERK TO BE COLLECTION AGENT**  
Because the county clerk is holding up his warrant for \$10 as election inspector, J. M. Buell has brought suit to force the delivery of the warrant. The county clerk says the warrant is held at satisfy a loan shark claim fifteen years old. When Buell was courthouse engineer fifteen years ago he assigned his salary for one month to a loan shark and this did not satisfy the loan shark's claim. It is alleged Buell denies the county clerk's right to act as a collection agent.

**RUSSIANS IN GERMANY PERMITTED TO GO HOME**  
ROTTERDAM, Sept. 16.—Russians residing in Germany have received permission to go home. Males from 17 to 45 years of age and active or retired officers are excepted in the order. The return of English, French and Belgian civilians in Germany is not yet permitted, but it is thought that this is merely a matter of a few days.

**FLIERS OF ALLIES RUN GREAT RISKS**  
British and French Aviators in Much Peril in Following Retreat of Germans.  
**WANDERING TEUTONS TAKEN**  
Detached Parties of Enemy Loose in Woods Captured by Pursuing Soldiers of Confederate Armies.

PARIS, Sept. 16.—It was generally anticipated that an attempt to stem the tide of their rapid retreat would be made by the Germans after the allies had forced them to retire defeated from the great field of battle to the east of Paris, where they had fought stubbornly for seven days and had suffered enormous losses.  
It has been revealed the British and French aviators ran during risks following the retrograde movements of the German army and succeeded in gathering the information that the Germans had erected field works at various places along the northern plateau beyond Rheims.  
These works were intended by the Germans for the event of meeting superior forces and being obliged to retire and reform.  
It is understood they left several army corps of their western wing and on their center with the desperate task of holding these lines so as to prevent their pursuers from harassing the bulk of the German army which, in the meantime was making a dash quickly for the frontier.  
Many detached parties of German troops have been captured wandering through the woods where they found themselves with little ammunition and no food supplies and deserted by their comrades, who were making forced marches.  
There has been no cessation in the preparations at Paris for defense. Although the Germans now are a considerable distance away and the likelihood of their return is regarded as remote, thousands of men are being enrolled daily for the formation of new forces and to fill the gaps in the ranks of the armies which have been in the field since the beginning of the war.

Some military critics are of the opinion that the stand being made by the Germans along the river Aisne is the beginning of a new battle which may develop into a combat almost, if not quite equally, as important as that on the Marne. It is pointed out, however, that the struggle must be a frontal one from the German side while the allies occupy positions from which an enveloping movement can be effected.  
The strength of the respective forces engaged, although kept secret, is believed to be almost equal. It is argued, however, that the allies possess the advantage of prestige which has been increased since they repulsed the Germans on the east of Paris. The allies also command the railroads, which enable them to bring reinforcements. This the Germans are not in a position to do, it is thought, owing to the activity of Belgians in keeping several German army corps engaged since taking the offensive from Antwerp.

**Czar Congratulates Poincare on Victory**  
BORDEAUX, Sept. 16.—President Poincare has received the following telegram from the Russian emperor:  
"The news of your victory gained by the French army fills me with joy. I send you most cordial congratulations. The valor of the troops and the talent of their chiefs are worthy the great nation to which they belong. I take pleasure in expressing all the admiration with which they inspire me."

**First German Army Fleeing Like a Mob**  
LONDON, Sept. 16.—The Morning Post's Petrograd correspondent says:  
"The first German army, which has been stiffened by several divisions, has virtually ceased to exist. The Germans are retreating like a panic-stricken mob. The Russians have crossed the lower reaches of the River San without opposition."

**RUSS PAPER WARNS OF 'THE WOUNDED BEAST'**  
PETROGRAD, Sept. 16.—(12:30 a. m.)—A Petrograd dispatch to the Reuter Telegram company says:  
"As an instance of Polish solidarity with Russia, it is noteworthy that youths of the Polish aristocrats have raised a troop consisting of themselves and their retainers. This body now is attached to one of the Russian guard regiments."  
"Referring to German concentration in east Prussia the Novoye Vremya says: 'Emperor William, not having succeeded in dining in Paris, hastening with an empty stomach to Petrograd, Germany, like a wounded beast confined behind strong bars, is hurling itself furiously from right to left. It must be remembered that a wounded beast is more dangerous than an unwounded one, until it is exhausted from loss of blood.'"
