

the suffrage movement. "Political, social and financial pressure is being brought to bear to bar the door of the voting booth to women of Nebraska. The Cincinnati politician who essouses the cause of suffrage must expect a vendetta which will pursue him whenever he enters public life and the banker, merchant and professional man must expect an attack upon his deposits, his trade and his clientele. We have in Nebraska an organization which takes no political vacation. In my observation of a quarter of a century, no chief magistrate of this city has ever been elected over the veto of this powerful interest. The time is ripe to end this condition before we stand diagraced by it. The traffic that politician who expuses the cause of suf- New York. stand disgraced by it. The traffic that has made Milwaukee famous should not to defy this power and crush it if

necessary. The speaker stated that universal suftimes and that in the olden days, when kings were alipowerful, the unfitness of the masses to rule themselves by the ballot was argued "with even greater eloquence than the late lamented manifesto of the anti-suffragists.
