PRINCE OF WALES WANTS TO FIGHT, BUT HE CANNOT LONDON, Sept. 19.—The prince of Wales was very eager to go to the front, according to a statement issued this evening by the official press bureau, and tried to get Lord Kitchener's consent to do so. But as he had not completed his military training, Lord Kitchener submitted to the king "that for the present it is undesirable that his royal highness should proceed on active service."

Eight German Army Corps Leave Belgium LONDON, Sept. 19.—The British-German correspondent says he learns from authentic sources that eight German army corps have left France and Belgium for the Russian frontier.
