The Women Golfers will meet next Friday afternoon at the Field club, when an annual meeting of the golfers will be held and officers elected.

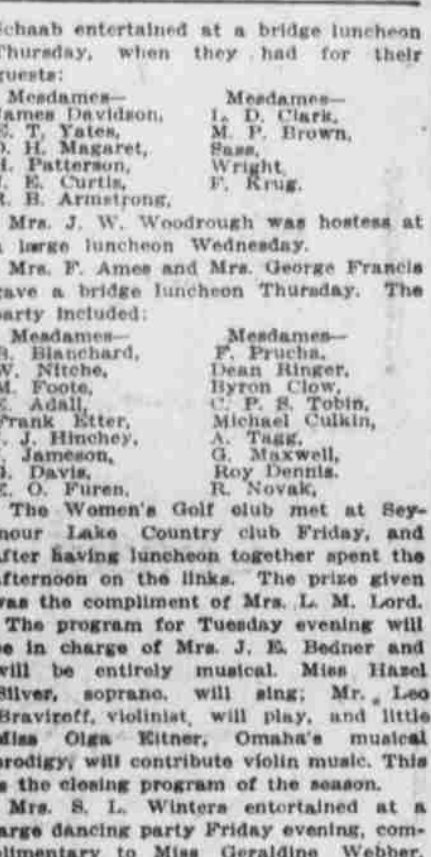

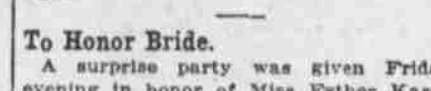
