BERLIN REJOICES OVER SEA VICTORY

Sinking of British Cruisers Causes Great Glee in Capital of the Kaiser's Empire.

War Summary

Momentous events that may decide the battle of the Aisne are transpiring near St. Quentin, where the allies are making a furious attempt to turn the German right wing.

Vague, but persistent reports, wholly unofficial, but coming from several points, suggest that the Franco-British turning movement is slowly developing. However, in the absence of official claims or admissions regarding this tremendously important action, little is definitely known.

Such official refesences are are made to the extreme western battiefield are very guarded. An English correspondent declares that the German right has been turned between Perronne and St.

The British admiralty has not made public its estimate of the casualties when three British cruisers were sunk by German submarines, but press reports indicate that probably from 1,200 to 1,500 officers and men were lost. Reports that two of the attacking submarines were sunk lack confirmation.

The German casualties so far as reported number 63,467, according to an announcement at Berlin. The latest casualty list issued last night bore 5,895 names. The deaths of General von Wroohem and General von Arbou are chronicled.

An official statement issued at Paris at 3 yesterday afternoon says that the allies have advanced their western wing after severe fighting. It is declared also that German attacks on the east wing of the allies have been repulsed. Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian forces, in reporting the capture of Jaroslau says there is no change the situation on the northwest-

It is announced officially at Nish that after a nine days' struggle the Austrians are in full retreat along the front from Liubovia to Losnitza.

A dispatch from Rome says it is reported that the Austrian cruisers Theresia and Admira! taun have put into Sebenico, ir Dalmatia, badly damaged.

A press report from Petrograd says that the railroads leading to Przmysl are being held by the Russians and that the Austrians are falling back behind the forts at Przemysl.

The Belgian army at Antwerp is reported as continuing occasional sorties against the German army, whose base is at Brussels.

ALLIES ADVANCE IN WEST, CHECK ATTACK IN EAST

Official Report Tells of Victory on Each Wing of the Long Battle Line in France.

LONDON VIEW OF SITUATION

Twelfth Day of Battle of Aisne Finds Struggle Swaying Indecisively.

MEANING OF GERMAN RETREAT

British Strategists Are Not Sure that Kaiser's Men Have Definitely Taken Defensive Position.

TRY TO OUTFLANK VON KLUCK

Desperate Fight for Possession of Town of Peronne.

GERMANS ATTACK FORT TREYON

Desperate Attempt is Being Made to

Break Line of Fortifications Between Verdun and Toulnoth Lose Heavily.

PARIS, Sept. 23 .- (3:07 p. m.)-The following official communication was sent out from Paris at

3 o'clock this afternoon: "First, on our left wing, on the right bank of the river Oise, we have advanced in the region of Lassigny. where there have been violent encounters with the enemy. On the left bank of the Oise and to the north of the river Aisne the situation is

"Second-On the center, between Rheims and the river Meuse, there has been no change of importance. In the Woevre district, to the northeast of Verdun and in the direction of Mouilly and Dompierre, the enemy undertook violent attacks, which were, however, repulsed. In the southern part of the Woevre district the enemy heads a line from Richecourt to Seicheprey to Lironville,

from which he has not issued. "Third-On our right wing, in Lorraine and the Vosges, the Germans have evacuated Nomeny and Arracourt and have shown little activity in the country around Domevre.

"The capture by the Russians of the fortress of Jaroslau, in Galicia, is announced."

LONDON, Sept. 21.-The twelfth day of fighting finds the battle of the Aisne still swaying indecisively. The Germans, as cording to British opinion, obviously hold the advantage in heavy artillery and the formidable natural positions they occupy would render a frontal attempt to dislodge them an almost superhuman task, Hence importance is attached to the movement of the allied army working to the eastward with a view to outflanking General Von Kluck's forces and threatening his communications. The German right already is reported in news dispatches to have been turned, but confirmation of this is lacking. Reports received here declare that entrenched positions have been prepared by the Ger-
