Eight More Omahans Safely Home from European War Zone

Eight more Omahans have just reached home, after trying times in Europe. They are: Rev. Lloyd E. Holsapple, rector of St. Barnabas' church, who was in England; Miss Josephine Nease, a graduate nurse, who was in Paris; Westleigh and De Wolf Barton, sons of Mrs. K. C. Barton, who were being tutored in Switzerland; Mr. and Mrs. William Newton and two children, who were touring in the war zone.

"There was no dire need of Red Cross nurses when I left Paris with Miss McCague and the Misses Pollard," says Miss Nease. "But now, after the recent terrible fighting in France, I guess the services of every nurse in the land is not sufficient to care for the thousands of sufferers."

Rev. Mr. Holsapple was in the British lines when the war began, and so his plans for further travel were spoiled. The Barton boys were with their sister, Miss Catherine, and their aunt, Mrs. F. J. Fartenheimer, of Chicago. They managed to get to Italy and sailed from there. Mrs. Fartenheimer, Miss Catherine and Mrs. Barton, who met them in New York, are remaining in Chicago for the present.

The Newton family reached Omaha Sunday, after much roundabout travel in getting away from the war zone. They went first to Paris from Belgium, then up to Copenhagen, and finally across to England, before securing transatlantic passage.

MANY ANSWER SAMSON'S INVITATION TO COME HOME

A total of 688 invitations were sent out to former Omaha people who are now scattered all over the world, asking them to come to Omaha for the last week of the Ak-Sar-Ben festival, which is designated "Homecoming" week this year. Replies were received from a great many, stating they would do their best to be here. Some of the replies came from as far east as England and as far west as the Philippines.

Forty Omahans to the Wyoming Fair
