The recent terrible hand-to-hand conflicts in the western and eastern wings arose from the attempts of the German and the allied generals to execute flanking movements in great force at the same time in the open country. The lines of the armies have been growing even longer in the last ten days in a mutual endeavor to overlap each other.

The wings have been heavily reinforced, but the allies have been able to bring greater power to bear and not only have prevented the Germans from breaking through, but have gained ground steadily and now have the advantage.

Fresh Troops Older Men. German prisoners who have been taken on the western end of the line in large numbers show that the reinforcements which have arrived recently consist largely of men who are nearing middle age. Some of them are fathers with familles, who have been away from the active army service ten or fifteen years. This seems to indicate that many corps have been withdrawn to meet the Bussian ad-

The German practice of maintaining an incessant offensive appears, according to military men, to be having the result of wearing out their human material. Some of their corps have been almost wiped out.

JUDGE GARY RESIGNS MORE DIRECTORSHIPS

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.-Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation, announced this afternoon that he had resigned as director from all companies with which he had been previously connected except where these companies was affiliated with the corporation.

Judge Gary's withdrawal from outside corporations is in line with the attitude known to prevail among certain business men, that inasmuch as the administration looks with disfavor on interlocking directorates, they should do their share, where possible, toward abolishing them.

The last company from which Judge Gary resigned as a director was the Southern Railway. Previously to that he had resigned directorships in twelve other corporations during the last twelve months.

FEATHERED -WARBLERS HIGH

Canney Bird Prices Sone Because the Songsters Come from Germany.

Those who may have been under the impression that canary birds imported into this country come from the Canary islands will suffer a severe distillusionment at this time, especially if the family believes that a canary hird is needed. and some one proceeds to "buy" a canary. The fact is that in times of peace canary birds come from the Hartz mountains in Germany, where they are bred by the peasants in garrets and spare rooms of their cottages. One New York firm alone imports 100,000 canaries annually.

At present no canaries can be bought in the bird stores because of the blockade of German ports. Ordinarily these birds sell for \$15 to \$30 a dozen. The individual birds is sold on his merits, as indicated by his looks and his voice. The female canary is a poor singer, and sells for half the price of the male. The birds sing best between the ages of a half year to 6 years. Frequently they live to be 12 years old.

The bird dealers also suffer from lack of cages for other birds. The canary is shipped in individual wooden cages made in Germany, and is sent in lots of 100 to 500.
