

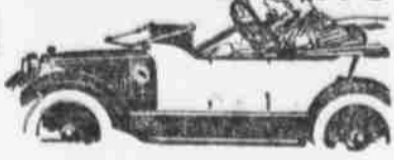

MAROONED IN PALESTINE

Former Omahan Robbed by Turks and Unable to Get Money.

SAYS MUCH SUFFERING EXISTS

Letter from Morris Steinberg Written at Saffed, Palestine, Dated More Than Month Ago, Received in Omaha.

Marooned in a little village in Turkish Palestine, no way to get money, people trying to leave the place despoiled by the government, those left behind starving—that is the experience of Morris Steinberg, a former resident of Omaha, as related to his family in a belated letter received by his son, Joe M. Steinberg, city salesman for Paxton & Gallacher, residing at 209 California. His father, Morris Steinberg, writes from Saffed, Palestine, under date of August 21, gives a vivid description of the suffering prevalent there as a result of the war.

On receipt of the letter Mr. Steinberg attempted to send funds to his father, but finding that the ordinary channels were vain appealed to Victor Rosewater, editor of The Bee, who had Congressman C. O. Lobock take it up with the Treasury and State departments at Washington. Congressman Lobock wired in return that Uncle Sam's efforts to transmit money to Palestine had been fruitless.

In Mr. Steinberg's letter, received September 25, which has been circulating among the members of his family, he says:

"I am unable to describe to you one-tenth of the suffering and misery that exists in the Holy Land. Jewish soldiers have never before been called out by the Turkish government, but now they are conscripting every male between the ages of 20 and 45 years, grandfathers as well as grandchildren.

Two Hundred Leave Saffed.
Two hundred persons, men, women and children, left Saffed at midnight on their way to Tapfa, where they expected to board trains which would take them to Akki, the port from which they could leave the country. Mules are generally used to convey travelers, the cost for this journey usually being 25 cents. Now the charge had been raised to 66 cents, but since everyone could not afford to pay that price, only fifty people rode, and the remaining 150 walked the entire journey.

"The following day the people who remained in the city made a collection of bread for the travelers who had gone on ahead. Those who remained in the city were themselves almost at the point of starvation, but the necessity for those traveling in the desert was even greater.

"The travelers were too feeble, however, to carry the provisions, so the city hired four mules to carry it to Tapfa, where they left for the port. Now, what do you suppose the Turkish government did? They took away the mules and the food, too. When the people reached Tapfa they expected to have food, having fasted two days, but there was not even a piece of dry bread to be secured. Here they were in the desert, even those having money being unable to buy food. They sent a message back to Saffed to tell of their plight, but in the meantime the ship sailed away and they were left in the hot desert until the next day. Only such a government as the Turkish would permit food to be taken from so many people and permit them to starve.

No Mail Received.
"No mail is received because no ships come into port. The Dardanelles are closed and no goods come in. Flour is three times as high as formerly and sugar and kerosene oil are not to be obtained. The banks have been closed for three weeks and no money is paid out at all. Even the wealthy are starving as well as the poor. The well-to-do have their money invested in business and distributed, even that is not available to them. The stores do no business on credit, for they have very little goods and will be unable to receive further supplies. For what little money they have, they want cash. Drafts received from America or other countries are not cashed, for no one has any money. They cannot even sell their goods at a real discount. They tried to cash a check from Baron Rothschild of Paris, but no one could cash it.

"This stringency is due to the fact that the Turks were called out first and drew their money out of the banks, leaving the banks without funds. The largest store in Saffed does only 50 cents business a day.

"For \$200 military service can be avoided, but those who can afford the \$200 are unable to secure the money from the banks. People would like to sell their property for any price, but, of course, that is out of the question. One of the wealthiest men of the city offered priceless jewels in order to secure the \$200, but he was only able to raise more than \$4.

Poor Box at House Dooms.
"The poor people go from house to house begging for food, but those who have been in better circumstances are too proud and would rather starve than beg for food. If this keeps on one week more, people will die in the streets of hunger.

"No coal can be bought, as it must be carried into the city by camels, and no one will send them out for fear the government takes away all provisions and shoes because there is such a shortage."

Mr. Steinberg, who was a resident of Omaha for twenty-eight years, left Omaha to make his home in Palestine nine years ago. He came back to Omaha for a visit with his three sons and daughter about five years ago, but returned to the Holy Land shortly afterward.

Rev. P. M. Lindberg of the Immanuel Deacons' institution will conduct the services in Rev. Lorimer's absence.

AUTO TIRE SENT POSTAGE COLLECT COSTS DOUBLE

There is one brand new automobile tire in the parcels post department at the postoffice, which has succeeded in being transported to its destination without any postage. It seems that an Omaha firm having shipped the tire to a customer out of the state sent the wrong make and in sending it back the customer neglected to place any postage on the article with the result that the auto firm will have to pay not only the return postage but double the amount.

WILLIAM ROBERT MORAN DIES AT LOS ANGELES

William Robert Moran, an employee of the Union Pacific at Omaha for seventeen years, died Thursday of pneumonia at Los Angeles. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Della McDermod of Omaha, and a son, Leslie, 9 years of age, also by three brothers, J. A. and Walter Moran of Omaha and Thomas Moran of Los Angeles, and a sister, Mrs. J. H. Garland of Omaha. The deceased was attached to the office of the auditor of passenger accounts while in the local Union Pacific headquarters. He went west to accept a better position. The funeral will be held in Los Angeles, but the body will be placed in a vault there and buried in Omaha next spring.

VISITOR GETS MONEY BACK FROM PAWNBROKER

Sam Fater, pawnshop keeper at 228 South Tenth, and Charles Terrell, an auctioneer, were arrested by Sergeant Flayce upon the complaint of C. L. Martin of Fremont, who declared he was hoodwinked. He entered the store and was high bidder on a \$1 watch, for which he paid \$3. This watch he later traded with \$10 to boot, for an \$5 watch, he said. Police Magistrate Foster allowed the defendant to go free when they gave the complainant back his money.
