#### MOUNT MACHINE GUNS IN ANTWERP CHURCH TOWERS

LONDON, Oct. 3.-The following official statement has been received from Berlin

"Russian prisoners at Crossen, Prussia, attempted to escape during a thunderstorm. The sentries opened fire, however, and three Russians were killed, eight severely injured and several slightly hurt. "It is reported from different sources that the Belgians already have placed machine guns in church towers of Antwerp. The siege of that city is making prog-
