GERMAN LOSS HEAVY CROSSING NIEMEN. Russians Lead Into Trap and Mow Down Soldiers by Thousands on Bridge.

EFFORTS TO CROSS FOILED. Twenty Thousand Bodies Carried Down River, is Report After Battle that Waged Desperately for Hours.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—A graphic account of the frustration of an attempt by the Germans to cross the Niemen river is given by the daily Telegraph's Petrograd correspondent.

"The Germans appear to have fallen into a Russian trap," the correspondent says. "On September 23 the rear guard of the Russian General Rennenkampf's army was transferred to the right bank of the river and the following evening the Germans approached the stream. The next day, seeing no signs of opposition, the Germans proceeded to construct pontoon bridges and completed this work without molestation."

Cossacks Sabre Enemy. LONDON, Oct. 4.—In a dispatch dealing with the fighting in the Russian provinces which border on east Prussia, the Petrograd correspondent of Reuter's Telegram company says:

"The recent German operations were practically vigorous along the railway routes, made abortive, while the German's intention was to reach Vilna by a turning movement around Yovon. The Russians began to fall back and then made a fierce counter attack. The shock was terrible. The Russians made frequent bayonet charges and drove back the Germans, on whom they inflicted enormous losses."

"A regiment of Cossacks made a dash into the ranks of the Germans who had occupied the Cossacks traversed Petrovsk with a flash of lightning, sabred 600 Germans in the streets and disappeared."

"It was only when the troops were pouring across the bridge to the other bank in fancied security that a sound like the roll of thunder was heard and dozens of Russian guns, cleverly posted and screened, opened their concentrated fire on the crowded bridge."

Swept Into River. "Before the blast of shrapnel and machine gun projectiles the Germans were swept into the river by hundreds. Speedily, however, the challenge of the Russian guns was taken up by the German artillery, and for a long time the duel continued. At last the Germans, thinking they had got the measure of the Russian gunners, made an attempt to throw their troops across the Niemen. But this time, also, they had no better luck, and not one of the soldiers who stepped upon the bridges either reached the opposite side or returned."

"The bodies of the slain floated in hundreds down the yellow flood in the Niemen. Still the Germans vigorously maintained their bombardment and about 6 o'clock in the evening made a last and desperate effort to utilize the bridges on which they spent such pains."

Mowed Down by Fire. "Columns in close formation were sent forward to the crossings, but once again every man was mowed down by the murderous fire of the Russian machine guns."

"With the fall of evening the German batteries were silenced one after the other by the steady and well directed fire of the Russian artillery. The enemy then fell back eight miles, pursued and hampered by Cossacks who had crossed the river on the German bridges. But this time, also, they had no better luck, and not one of the soldiers who stepped upon the Niemen after this awful carnage."

"In the fight at Sredniki, on the Niemen, September 15, the German casualties are also said to have been large. An eyewitness of the battle says that in the river and on one of its banks no fewer than 8,000 Germans perished. On the opposite shore from the city the bodies of 1,500 Germans were lying unburied for some days afterwards."

Russians Lose Heavily Before Prussian's Fort. LONDON, Oct. 5.—A dispatch from Amsterdam to Reuter's Telegram company says:

"The German commander at Koenigsberg, east Prussia, has officially announced that the Russian armies in the battles of October 1 and 1 lost 3,000 prisoners, eighteen big guns, many machine guns and much transport material."

Italy Wants to Grab a Slice of Austria. ROME, Oct. 5.—(Via Paris)—Italians from Trent in Austria, who reside in Italy, have petitioned the Italian parliament to complete the work of freeing Italy, begun by King Victor Emmanuel and Garibaldi. They request that Italy unite to the kingdom the Austrian provinces inhabited by Italians. The petitioners are headed by Signor Battisti, a socialist deputy from Trent.

MILAN, Oct. 4.—(Via Paris, Oct. 5)—A great meeting was held here tonight and before a large and enthusiastic crowd Senator Bassani, a socialist deputy from Trent, Austria, made a speech in which he said he was much touched by the imposing demonstration. He could only say, as a son of Trent, that it was awaiting liberation by its Italian brethren.

"The liberation of Trent and Trieste," he said, "means the accomplishment of a duty left as a heritage by the great makers of the fatherland."

The enthusiastic crowd, following the speech, passed resolutions and made attempts of the police and carabinieri to restrain the people were in vain. At the Montenegro consulate the crowd made a manifestation of sympathy and then marched to the monument of Garibaldi where other speakers delivered their speeches.

LEVY AND PEYCKE FAMILIES ARE SOON TO SAIL FOR HOME. Mr. and Mrs. Morris Levy and Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Peycke, who have been in the war zone, called to Omaha friends that they had engaged passage on the Rotterdam from Rotterdam, which was to have sailed Saturday, but that the sailing date had been postponed until some time in the latter part of this week.

President Meets Colonel Harvey On Peace Sunday. WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—President Wilson and George Harvey, former editor of Harper's Weekly, but now of the North American Review, whose controversy over the support of Harper's Weekly furnished one of the chief incidents of Mr. Wilson's campaign for the presidency, celebrated Peace Sunday today by a harmony meeting at the White House.

ADMIRALTY SAYS LOSS ON CRUISERS WAS 1,433. LONDON, Oct. 5.—Exclusive of officers, 1,433 lives were lost on the sinking of the British cruisers Aboukir, Cressy and Hogue in the North Sea September 2, according to a report issued by the admiralty tonight. The Aboukir lost 810 men, the Cressy 561 and the Hogue 362.
