Hummel Has Splendid Collection Housed at Hanscom Park.

INVITATION TO THE PUBLIC

Park Commissioner Invites Omahans to Inspect Various Plants Which Will Continue to Bloom Through Winter.

All necessary arrangements for a thorough and complete exhibition of chrysanthemums, carnations, hyacinths, and other winter-blooming plants have been made by Commissioner of Parks J. C. Hummel. The exhibit will be in the greenhouses at Hanscom park during the winter months.

The collection of chrysanthemums will gladden the heart of lovers of this particular winter flower, as careful attention was given to the selection of varieties, seldom seen in the commercial line. In the carnation collection will be shown a number of the best known varieties including famous prize-winning plants. All colors are represented, including a famous yellow species.

The hyacinths are of the stant massive variety, not often planted for other than exhibition purposes.

This collection, together with the Joseph and plants, will be shown to visitors at the greenhouses. Commissioner Hummel extends a cordial invitation to the public to visit this collection.

Flowers in Collection. A complete list of the varieties of the different plants to be exhibited together with a description of the same follows:

CHRYSANTHEMUMS. Dragon Vert—The king supreme of the red and gold selection; enormous in size, very regular and full in arrangement of petals, the peer of any exhibition sort.

William Vert—Crimson, with every petal reflex, reverse of petal is bright gold, but practically every petal reflexes so the golden color is most seen, unquestionably the coming crown.

Allen Salomon—An incurving pure white big flower, with light weight stem and foliage close to stem.

Cherish—The loveliest pink of them all, keeps in bud, without fading.

A. J. Balfour—Coral, rose pink, broad petals of great abundance, nothing compares with it in color.

Antique—A deep bronze.

Aesthetic—Beautiful shade of delicate primrose and orange center, with petals arranged in a fine, regular pattern.

Chadwick Improved—Pure snow white, never tints.

C. H. Totty—Chestnut and scarlet, a grand variety, stem and foliage perfect.

Christy Mathewson—A big, fine white, full and massive, very distinct in form, pure snow white of enormous size, one of the showiest mums for exhibits.

Chadwick Supreme—The lavender sport of W. H. Chadwick.

Countess Granard—An enormous exhibition yellow, good rich color.

Dr. Englewood—Coral pink, stem and foliage perfect.

Ethel Thorpe—An enormously large incurving pink variety of very pure type, extra fine.

F. S. Vallis—An immense Japanese flower, yellow, deepening to a fine citron shade, long petals, reflexing and reflexing into broad, deep bloom.

Golden Wedding—Nothing finer among yellow, shines like a crown, one of the showiest mums for exhibits.

Golden Gem—Deep golden shade, round as a ball, full and solid, with exquisite foliage.

Golden Eagle—The long, incurving golden petals are glorious.

Golden Chalice—The very best late yellow of a deep golden strain.

Glennview—An enormous incurving globe of dark bronze and clear red.

General Hutton—Yellow, shaded orange, enormous size.

Glaizer—Pure white in color, enormous in diameter, deep in bud, very perfect in form.

L. A. Lorraine—A giant, velvety crimson.

Lynwood Hall—Glistening snow white of the largest size, perfectly incurved, of elegant form, stands at the very head of the white variety in the 1913 shows.

Lady Carmichael—Pure white, Japanese reflexed.

Nakota—An immense orange buff, of perfect form and beautiful finish.

Ranapo—Enormously large, fine golden yellow.

Unaka—A lavender pink, strong grower with long stem and good foliage.

Winkler Cheer—Beautiful, round, incurving pink.

W. H. Chadwick—Magnificent variety without rival for finish.

William Vert—A perfect incurved variety, quite globular, snow white, of enormous size, stands at the very head of the white variety in the 1913 shows.

Yellow Eaton—Bright yellow, a strictly fine mum in carnations.

SINGLE CHRYSANTHEMUMS. Menna—A big, flat, white, like giant Shasta daisy.

Mrs. William Buckingham—Big flower with petals of wonderful texture, fine shade of soft rose pink.

Mary Richardson—A golden apricot color.

Miss Curtis—Glowing crimson scarlet.

CARNATIONS. Gorgeous—A giant corse variety, the color is superb, glowing crimson, suffused with brilliant vermilion, edges of petals rosy cerise.

Matchless—The matchless white, a very sensational variety, winner of two gold medals, pure white and of high quality, large and very firm.

Champion—A fine scarlet, good calyx and fine color.
