Now it seems almost too good to be true that real music is going lo be a part of the production of the best film photoplays. If the art of improvisng is rejunevated think how much fur he rest of us will have while the improvisor is making his melodies by looking at each other and murmuring, "That is from Chopin," 'I think I recognize portion of Mozart," "Ah, Beethoven," "I wonder where he got that," or, perhaps, That must be Schonberg."


