TORPEDO SINKS BRITISH CRUISER; 350 LOSE LIVES

Hawke Wrecked in North Sea by a German Submarine with Heavy Loss of Life.

FIFTY-ONE OF CREW ARE SAVED

Armored Warship Reported to Have Had at Least Four Hundred

SIXTH NAVAL LOSS OF BRITISH

Other Cruisers Sunk Were Amphion, Pathfinder, Aboukir, Hogue and Cressy.

LONDON, Oct. 16 .- The British cruiser, Hawke has been sunk in the North Sea by a German submarine. Out of a crew of 400 men fifty-one were saved.

The British cruiser was of 7,350 tons displacement. It was 360 feet long, of sixty feet beam and drew twenty-three feet of water. It was a sister ship of the Edgar, Endlmon. Grafton, Thoseus and Gibraltar, and was launchen in 1891.

Its armament consisted of two 9.2-inch. guns, ten 6-inch guns, twelve 6-pounders, five 3-pounders, two machine gunz and Polite Demand on Commander of the two torpedo tubes. Its complement la given as 544 men, but it may have had

The Hawke was commanded, according to the British admiralty list of September, 1914, by Captain Hugh P. E. T. Williams and among its officers were Commande Bernard A. Pratt-Barlow and Lieutenant Commander Robert R. Rosoman.

ALLIES HOLDOWN EVERYWHERE, IS FRENCH REPORT

"On Our Left Wing the Action Continues Vigorously," According to Paris Communication.

MAKE GAIN AT CERTAIN POINTS

Laventie Occupied, East of Estaires in Direction of Lille, by Confederates.

GERMAN'S ATTACK IS IN VAIN

Hannescamps, Near Arras, Also Falls Into Hands of Troops of the Coalition.

TEUTONS ADVANCE TO COURTRAI GERMAN ADVANCE REPORTED

Fighting Near the Meuse Desperate, Though Overshadowed by Operations on the Left Wing of the Allied Forces.

PARIS, Oct. 16 .- "On our left wing the action continues vigorously," says an official communication issued this evening. "Everywhere we have held our own. At certain points we have gained ground and have occupied Laventie, east of Estaires in the dihection of Lille.

"There is no important incident to mention on the other parts of the front except an unsuccessful attack by the Germans in the region of Malancourt, northwest of Verdun."

Hannescamps Taken. WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.-Capture of Hannescamps, southwest of Arras, by the allies, and an advance by the Germans from Audenarde to Courtral were announced in an official dispatch made public here by the French embassy.

The dispatch follows: "The Germans have advanced from Audenarde toward Courtral. The enemy occupies a line of defense at Meroin, Armentiers and Givenchy. To the west of LaBassee it is in contact with our troops between that locality and Arras A violent combat took place northwest of Lens to Vermelles, which resulted in our favor. We have taken Hannescamps, outhwest of Arras."

Allies Keep Pounding Away. PARIS, Oct. 16 .- The steady hammering of the allies on the German left wing of the French battle front has brought them almost within cannon range of the forts at Metz. In spite of this menace, part of the German crown prince's army hangs on doggedly to the positions it has taken on the Meuse near St. Miniel. The fighting on this end of the long battle line is said to have been desperate during the last week, though overshadowed for the time by the operations on the allies' left. More important developments, however, are looked for between the Meuse and rivers goes on in the west.

War Summary

German naval forces have scored again. The British admiralty announces that the cruiser Hawke was sent to the bottom in the North sea by a German submarine Thursday.

The French War offce announced yesterday that the progress of the allies indicated in Thursday's communication had been confirmed. The field of action on the left wing of the allied armies extends from the region of Ypres to the sea.

There was no official word from Berlin up to late yesterday, but news dispatches report that the Germans marching on Ostend are within ten miles of their objective, having occupied Blankenberghe, a town on the Belgian coast connected by rail with Os-

The belief grows in London that Ostend will not be occupied by the Germans until at least they have fought for its possession.

It is reported that British warships will take part in the defense of the town.

The French embassy at Washington has received advices saying that the allies have captured Hannescamps, a town about ten miles north of Albert. There is no other news regarding the fighting on the northern end of the battle line in France.

The Paris statement says that Russian troops have repulsed German attacks on Warsaw and Ivangorod, in Russian Poland, and that a battle is being fought south of Przemysl.

LONDON, Oct. 16 .- The correspondent of the Times in Paris, in a review of the situation on the French battle front,

"The German army corps which has driven the French from Lille had little effect on the whole situation. Between the Lys river and the town of La Bassee, thirteen miles southwest of Lille, the situation remains unchanged. The Germans destroyed the town hall at Arras, a fine sixteenth century building.

"The enemy has abandoned the attempt to latter a way to Paris through Roye, although guns are still active there. The enemy is also slackening its efforts on the heights of Brimont and southeast of Rheims, where the silles have taken several formidable trenches.

"The German efforts to envelope Verdun from the north and from the southeast have been defeated. The position of the German wedge, pushed through from Pont a Mousson to St Mihiel, is becoming more and more uncomfortable."

Peasant Girls Fight Against Germans

LONDON, Oct. 16 -- A disperch to Reuter's Telegram company from Petrograd says:

"To the local peasantry, among them many girls, is attributed in part the failure of the German attempts to cross the Vistula during the recent fighting. The girls aided the Russian soldiers by digging trenches,

Thus it seemed that the taking of the popular seaside resort by the invaders was a foregone conclusion within twenty-four hours, if not already effected at this writing. and the news delayed as it was when the forts at Antwerp fell before the terrible fire of the German siege
