Evanston, Ill., Nov. 6 .- Government expenditures during the present fiscal year will be \$500,000,000 ess than last year, Assistant Secretary Clifford of the treasury declared tonight in an address here. "For this fiscal year, 1923," he said, "we expect to run the government on less than 100,000 barrels of crude oil in \$2,000,000,000 from the cost of government in 1921 and nearly \$500, 000,000 less than in the last fiscal are burning tonight and Smackover year. Thus it can be seen that the greatest effort possible is being made by the present administration to reduce government expenditures.
