Don't Miss This! POSSIBILITIES OF STATE WATER POWER ARE OUTLINED

Bridgeport, Neb., Dec. 6.—At the meeting of the Nebraska State Irrigation association here Wednesday, "Water Power in Nebraska" was discussed in a paper by Dean O. J. Ferguson of the college of engineering, University of Nebraska, which, in the dean's absence, was read by Superintendent Thomas H. McCarthy of the Scottsbluff School of Irrigation. An abstract of the discussion follows: "Although only about 8 per cent of the electrical power now used in Nebraska comes from water, we should study our latent possibilities in developing all such sources of energy supply as are available."

The state divides naturally into seven water-power regions of widely varying characteristics: 1—The Platte river, traversing the state from west to east, with practically no tributaries from the south and only one large confluence in the western two-thirds of the state; 2—The Niobrara river, following the northern tier of counties; 3—The Republican river, similarly skirting the southern edge of the state; 4—The Loup system, in the center of the state; 5—The Elkhorn river in the northeast; 6—The Blue and other rivers in the south; 7—The White River and Hat Creek in the northwest.

These several regions have widely different drainage characteristics. The Platte from our western borders to Columbus is a sluggish, sand-laden stream very unlike the Colorado and Wyoming parts of the South Platte and North Platte, which are mountain streams. The major developments upon the Platte are likely to be an outgrowth of the beginnings now existing just over the line in Wyoming, at Guernsey, Whalen and Hazlet. The chief characteristic of the Platte in Nebraska is its variable flow, changing from flood stage to no surface flow.

The Loup system of several parallel rivers, joining before entering the Platte at Columbus, drains a permeable basin which regulates to a very small extent the flow of the Platte immediately following a heavy rain. This constancy of flow, taken together with the good gradients gives this system about one-fifth of the total possible water power of the state. The Columbus site might afford some 20,000 horsepower. The remainder of the system has the physical possibility of about 80,000 horse power, only a small part of which will probably ever be utilized.

Markets for the Columbus power might be found in Omaha, sixty-five miles distant, or in Lincoln, fifty-five miles distant. If the development of the Loup system is not forthcoming in the very immediate future, the growth of the communities may be enough to absorb the power as it becomes available, either by large-scale, some one point or by widespread applications both in towns and on farms.

Beginnings in interconnection of electrical transmission systems have been made and are progressing rapidly. One system serves over 100 towns and though not under one ownership, totals about 350 miles of line. Another well laid-out system supplies about 25 towns. Other lines exist and are being extended.
