SCHOOL CHILDREN BEING EXAMINED

Each One is Being Weighed as Well and Tags Given Them for Parents' Observation of Case.

The examination of the physical condition of the children in the Plattsmouth public schools is now going on and as the result the children after being weighed are given tags that they are to take home to their parents and which constitutes for the a report on how the child compares with the average for the normal healthy child.

The white card indicates that the child is at least seven per cent average as a normal healthy child and of correct weight.

The blue card indicates that the child is from seven to ten per cent under weight or twenty per cent over weight as the report will state.

The red tag indicates that the child is ten per cent under weight. The chief causes of under weight are from ailments and bad tonsils altho the lack of fresh air, lack of proper sleep, excessive eating of sweets and tea and coffee and proper food makes a wonderful difference in the child.

To overcome this a rest period of a short time before noon and evening meals helps and also mid morning and afternoon lunches but not sufficient to spoil the appetite for a meal.

For children that are over weight it is urged there be less eating of white bread, potatoes and sweets.

LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM OF STATE FARM UNIONS

"Dollar Matching" Opposed; Long Time Credit Sought on Farm Securities by Farmers.

Lincoln, Dec. 12.—The program of the legislative committee of the Nebraska Farmers' Union with a 20,000 membership, announced by Chairman J. O. Shroyer of Humboldt here today includes:

Opposition of "dollar matching" of state and federal funds.
Taxation of public utilities on rate making value.
Forcing "tax free" securities to bear their share of support to government.

Long time credit on farm land and personal securities.
Water power program that will render Nebraska farm and factory "tax subsistent" to the evil barons.

Opposition to "unification of work in public departments and institutions which are now bringing dis-

order and inefficiency of administration."
A federal highway plan whereby state highways will get forty per cent of funds and sixty per cent be left for other roads.

Opposition to gasoline tax or higher automobile tax projects.
"Stricter enforcement of the law and less condoning of lawbreakers" as a means of doing away with disrespect of law and mob violence.

"We emphatically oppose any plan that tends toward the centralized control of our educational funds and systems," the report says. "Our public expenses and we have seen the inauguration of strong efforts by special interests to get control of this wealth and power by county unit or other method of centralization."

"We are demanding more flexible and adaptable courses of study, not toward higher institutions but toward a better development of the best individuality. Only a fraction of our students ever cross the threshold of a college or university, yet the vast majority have a misfit education on account of the narrow courses that lead only to those institutions."
