HIGH CHARACTER IDEALS NEEDED— BISHOP SHAYLER

Well Known Churchman Fears Upheaval Against Anglo-Saxon Civilization Dangerous.

"If we are going to have a better civilization, we must have better manhood and better moral fiber. Character culture is the thing that counts," said Bishop E. V. Shayler, addressing the Rotary club of Omaha at a luncheon at the Hotel Fontenelle Wednesday.

The bishop stated that education has been tried as a cure for the ills that beset civilization, but education alone has not been effective. "I am not a pessimist," the bishop added, "but the facts face us. There is a revolt against the Anglo-Saxon civilization. There is a current of revolutionary upheaval and it behooves us to ponder and to serve our civilizations well. We know that civilizations and republics as great as ours have passed and we must face the facts as they are. I want all of us to strive to make Omaha a better, bigger and brighter city."

Moral Repair Costly
The speaker noted that Nebraska is paying \$1,500,000 a year for the work of moral repair and Omaha is paying \$500,000 a year to maintain its human repair shop. He quoted from statistics to show that the so-called lower stratum of society is breeding at a rate much higher than that of the superior element. Hereditarily, he asserted, is the great factor in the advancement of civilization.

SPEAKERSHIP TO BE THE FIRST MATTER CONSIDERED

Until That is Settled Party Lines will Remain Closely Drawn, Says the State Journal.

In less than three weeks the Nebraska legislature will be in the harness. The house democrats will hold a caucus and will place a candidate for speaker in the field. There are forty-one of them and forty-one is many as compared with the four or two years ago and something like fourteen years ago. During the 1919 legislative opening the little band of democrats caucused and placed Theo Osterman on the plank as their candidate for speaker. Mr. Osterman may again be the minority nominee.

Regardless of increased democratic strength in the lower house, a republican will be speaker. Two years ago the republicans could find no democrats to fight with so they proceeded to fight among themselves, with the result that Walter Anderson, defeated G. O. P. candidate for congress from the 1st Nebraska district at the election last month, was chosen for the job.

This year things will be different. There will be increased caucus duty to stick together along political lines. The republicans will probably stick unanimously together until after a speaker is selected, although farmers are talking of a farm bloc, democrats are trying to line up with anti-code republicans and other undercurrents of opinion are running rife. Scott Reynolds, of North Platte, ranchman and former member of the legislature, is much referred to as a possible choice, says the Lincoln State Journal, continuing: Grant Myers, of Wayne, author of the capitol bill, is said to be in a receptive mood. Dan Garber of Red Cloud and George T. Staats of Fremont also are candidates. T. B. Dysart, of Omaha, has been mentioned, but there is nothing above the surface to indicate that he would care to fight for the job. D. S. Hardin, J. Reid Green and J. W. ("Big Bill") Lundy also have been mentioned.

VETERINARIANS TO WORK ON DAIRY LAW

State Committee Authorized to Cooperate in Having Part of Cattle Test Act Repealed.

The law regulating the testing of dairy cattle, enacted by the last Nebraska legislature, is characterized as unsatisfactory and impracticable in a resolution adopted by the state veterinary medical convention held in Lincoln this week, and the association was authorized to appoint a committee to work for its repeal.

The veterinarians objected to this section of the measure at the time of its passage, and since, on the ground that some of the fees prescribed are unreasonably high and some too low, and the bill is objectionable to dairymen and veterinarians, and this position was reiterated in the resolution. The doctors voted to work with the dairymen to obtain the repeal of the unsatisfactory section of the dairy law.

Other resolutions adopted by the convention included endorsement of the Blue Cross movement relative to using anaesthetics in painful operations on animals; and votes of thanks to the Lincoln chamber of commerce, the Eppy Hotel company, the faculty of the animal pathology department, university college of agriculture, and the local committee on arrangements, for their activities in making the convention a success.
