PASSENGERS ARE LITERALLY COOKED BY LIVE STEAM

Train on Texas Road Sideswipes a Switch Engine—Broken Pipe Protrudes Into Car.

Houston, Tex., Dec. 13.—Fifteen persons were instantly killed and approximately 40 others were injured, many fatally, when the "rabbit" passenger train No. 25 of the Houston, East & West Texas railroad sideswiped a switch engine near the depot at Humble, a few minutes after 10 Wednesday night.

The cylinder heads of the two locomotives struck, that on the right side of the passenger engine and that on the left side of the freight locomotive being ripped away.

As the cylinder heads ripped loose a two-inch steam pipe on the freight engine, which ran from the cylinder to the steam chest, tore loose and crashed into the window of the smoking car—the first coach of the passenger train—literally cooking its passengers with live steam and scalding water.

Conductor Killed

Conductor Kempsey of Houston, for 19 years a familiar figure to travelers on the road, was killed instantly. The train news dealer died at his post, his body being found underneath a pile of candy, newspapers and magazines.

AMBASSADOR SUMMONED TO RETURN HOME

GEORGE HARVEY WILL SAIL FOR U. S. DEC. 23 FOR PROBABLE CONFERENCE.

OFFICIAL COMMENT WITHHELD

At Washington as Well as at the Embassy Office in London—Numerous Surmises.

London, Dec. 15th.—Ambassador Harvey has been called home for consultation, it was stated at the American embassy this afternoon.

He will sail on the Berengaria on December 23rd, but will not be accompanied by Mrs. Harvey, who will leave the preceding day for a visit to Madeira.

The nature of the consultation for which the ambassador was summoned was not known at the embassy, where it was said the message calling him to Washington merely said it was "for a consultation." It is presumed the discussions with Secretary of State Hughes will cover the whole range of European affairs, including the allied debts, reparations and kindred subjects.

Ambassador Harvey has been confined to his bed with a cold for two or three days, but his condition is not sufficiently serious to prevent him from making definite plans for sailing.

Mrs. Harvey, who has been quite ill recently, is still indisposed, but it is thought she will be able to sail for Madeira December 22, with the expectation of remaining there while her husband is in the United States. She will be accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Marcellus Thompson, and the latter's daughter.

Stanley Baldwin, the chancellor of the exchequer, and the other members of the British mission which is to visit Washington for discussions regarding the British debt to the United States, will sail for the United States December 27.

Today the London announcement that Mr. Harvey had been called home "for consultation," they declined to make any explanation as to the specific questions Secretary Hughes desired to discuss with him.

In the absence of an official explanation the impression gained currency that Mr. Harvey had been called to Washington in connection with the situation as to German reparations now threatening a rupture between Great Britain and France.

Dr. Otto Weidfeldt, the German ambassador, conferred at length today with Secretary Hughes, but no information was available as to whether their conversation touched on reparations or took cognizance of the serious economic situation in Germany reflected by reports received through official American trade channels.

The call of the German envoy at the state department, however, coming just before the usual Friday cabinet meeting, was regarded as a possible indication that the president and his official family might desire to have before them at once all available information as to precise conditions in Germany as they relate to the problem of reparations payments.

REFEREE CAUSES SENSATION

Omaha, Dec. 15.—Dave Miller, referee at the Schoell-Schade bout here tonight caused a sensation after the fight, when as he stepped from the ring, he declared that he had been offered \$500 to throw the fight to Schoell. When questioned Miller said that he had been approached by a group of Omaha gamblers. "I turned down the offer," Miller declared, but did not let it influence me in the other direction. Shade earned the decision." H. H. Antles, secretary of the state department of public welfare, assisted by John Kilmartin, city boxing commissioner, at once began an investigation into the charge.

BRITAIN WOULD SETTLE YANK CONSULATE CASE

London, Dec. 14.—Proposals were made by Great Britain last month for an amicable settlement of the case surrounding the closing of the American consulate at Newcastle-On-Tyne, but they were not accepted by the American government, the house of commons was informed today by Donald McNeill, under-secretary of the foreign office.

He added that the question was being further considered.

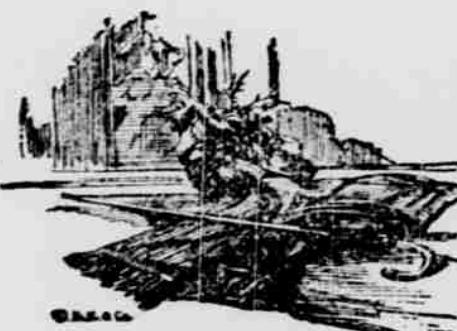

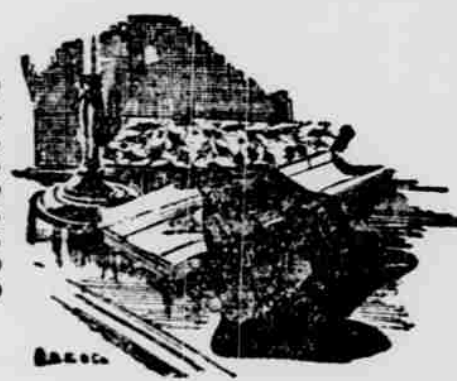
