POPE PIUS ASKS SOVIET TO FREE CONVICTED CLERGY

Makes Request on the Ground that Priests are Subjects of the Roman Catholic Church.

Rome, March 28.—Pope Pius has asked the soviet government of Russia to liberate Archbishop Zepiak and other ecclesiastics convicted in Moscow on the ground that they are members of the Catholic hierarchy and the pope's subjects.

The negotiations in favor of Archbishop Zepiak and the others have been entrusted to Professor Walsh, formerly a member of the American relief commission in Russia and now head of the pontifical mission for relief in southern Russia.

Lincoln, March 28.—By viva voce vote and with only scattering opposition, the senate committee substitute for H. R. 272, the banking bill, was advanced to third reading.

SOVIET GIVES RESPITE

Warsaw, March 28.—The Polish government has been informed through the soviet ministry in Warsaw that the death sentence against Archbishop Zepiak, head of the Roman Catholic church in Russia, will not be carried out by the Russian government.

ELECTION CONTEST AT GRAND ISLAND

Mayor Ellsberry Opposed for Second Term by Councilman Haux—Bonds to be Voted On.

Grand Island, Neb., March 29.—Grand Island has a majority contest that is eliciting considerable interest and, at the same time, a school building bond campaign that is practically forcing the voters for the third time.

The caucus touched only one issue and that was but momentarily. The proposal of demanding a viaduct over the Union Pacific crossings was quickly withdrawn when someone asked who was going to foot the bill.

SENATE BANKING BILL ADVANCED TO THIRD READING

Bryan Opposes Some Provisions and Veto is Possible—Vote on it Nearly Unanimous.

Little objection developed on the bill in the senate. Senator C. B. Anderson, member of the banking committee and chairman of the revenue committee, took exception to the provision which gives control of the bankers' conservation fund, with the indirect bearing which it has on the guaranty fund to the bankers' association committee.
