FIRST CORN WHISKY MADE IN OKLAHOMA

Was Famous Distillery and Turned Out "Likker" for Saloon Trade—Ruined by Politics.

Ponca City, Okla., April 30.—This part of northern Oklahoma has the distinction of having had at one time an honest-to-goodness distillery within its midst. It was a federal regulated plant with gauger and everything and was in existence for many years immediately following the opening of the Cherokee strip in 1893. It was located at the old town of Cross, which now adjoins Ponca City on the north, and was the early day political headquarters of the various parties.

The owner of the distillery was Captain W. H. Baker, of Arkansas, to which state he returned in later years. He understood how to make the best grade of corn liquor, and it was this grade that he made at Cross and sold in drinks over his bar, for in addition to owning the distillery, Captain Baker also conducted the town's important livery stable and ran a saloon. He had the distinction of making the first corn whiskey in Kay county, in fact, in all northern Oklahoma.

Downfall in Livery Stable. It was his livery stable, so old-timers here say, that finally broke the captain and not his distillery and saloon. His place was political headquarters in campaigns and candidates and voters not only drank his liquor, freshly run, but they also drove his teams over the county seeking votes. Sometimes the candidates did not have much money, so they took the teams on promise to pay. In one particular campaign, the last one in which the captain figured, the candidates whom he had favored were not elected and the bills were never paid. The result was that the captain went broke and returned to Arkansas.

The principal justice of the peace court for the district was located just across the street from the distillery saloon. All other justices did a very small business in comparison with the man who presided there, for it was the popular thing to do to take a change of venue on anything and from everybody to the cross justice. It was the unchanging custom also for the attorneys, plaintiffs, defendants, jurors, witnesses and sometimes the court himself to cross the street for a "nip."

Some Times Court Was Called Off. And it happened on many occasions that one drink called for another. After one fellow had "set 'em up," another would always demand that they "have one on me boys" and the barkeeper would be instructed to "fill 'em up again."

This custom led to many court actions having to be postponed to another day or until such time as the participants were in proper condition to do business. And sometimes the attorneys and others did not even return to the courtroom at all, so alluring were the attractions at the captain's bar.

18 MEASURES ARE SIGNED BY BRYAN

Still Holds 22 Bills Passed by Legislature Before Adjournment—Banking Bill Signed.

Lincoln, May 2.—Governor Bryan today signed and returned 18 bills to the house and senate. There are still 22 bills in the hands of the governor.

Among the bills signed today was one dealing with the banking situation and another to permit the university boards of regents to inaugurate the dormitory system at Nebraska.

Following is the list of bills signed:
S. F. 101—The egg candling bill.
S. F. 116—Makes chairman of horticulture department in agriculture department secretary of the state park board, in place of the state engineer.

S. F. 200—Repeals compulsory telephone connections law and fine mileage system.
S. F. 198—Lincoln school fire ordinance may conform to city ordinance.

S. F. 220—Gives court discretionary power to fix receiver's bonds.
S. F. 253—Deputy sheriffs can hold no other official position and must turn in fees.

S. F. 307—Allows administrator of estate to extend time on notes.
S. F. 331—Makes paving assessments in villages and smaller cities payable annually for 10 instead of 20 years. Allows Falls City to make temporary investment of proceeds of former bond issue.

H. R. 198—Resolution memorializing congress to repeal the Esch-Cummins law.
H. R. 204—Burden of proof for damage to livestock on railroads.
H. R. 237—Lightens up borrowing restrictions on state banks, provides machinery for coming under rural credits act and contains famous "missing clause" in limiting powers of guaranty fund commission.

H. R. 33—Authorizes election of police judge at regular spring election.
H. R. 288—Eradication of scabies. Appropriates \$10,000 for work.

H. R. 313—Relief appropriation of \$5,000 each for Mrs. Nettie McGomber and Mrs. Mary Rogers, widows of North Platte police officers.
H. R. 409—Forbids signs within 400 feet of railroad crossings or highway crossings.

H. R. 411—Relief appropriation of \$5,000 for children of Penitentiary Guard Robert L. Taylor, killed by convict James King.
H. R. 724—Reduces oil inspection fees from 6 cents to 3 cents.

H. R. 638—Authorizes regents of the state university to pay up 5 1/2 per cent on private capital invested in university dormitories.

BURLINGTON TO STORE 500,000 TONS OF COAL

The Burlington route has voluntarily taken the most practical step possible to solve the coal question. It is purchasing from mines on its lines a tremendous supply—500,000 tons—which is being stored at points where it will be used next winter.

This means that the Burlington will haul its own coal when the cost of transportation is low, which will result in the release next winter, for commercial purposes, of the engines and cars which otherwise would be required to protect its own coal pile. It will also provide work for the miners during the summer or slack season.

There is no more practical solution to this problem. If the public—individually, collectively and generally, adopted this plan, it would more evenly distribute traffic throughout the year and tend to prevent a coal shortage and equipment shortage or a freight congestion next winter.

Frank E. Vallery came in this morning from Grant, Nebraska, where he has been for a few days looking after some real estate business in that section.

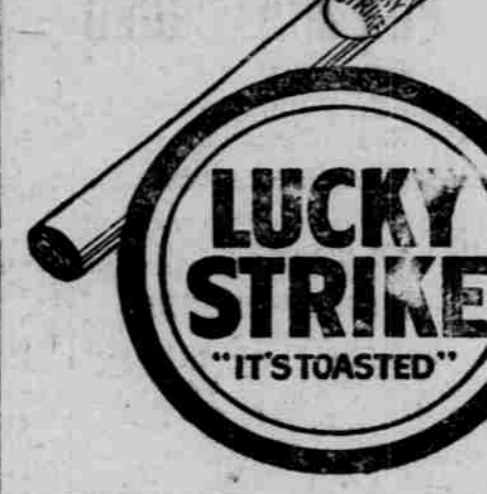
