Hatt and Chase made the most effective tackling for the locals against their opponents but this was unavailing as the attack of the South Siders crumpled the Plattsmouth line at will and Graham carried the ball over in the first six minutes for a touchdown and kicked goal.

SAYS STATE TO LOSE ALL OF OIL INSPECTION FEES

Standard Oil Objects to Paying Inspection Costs—Says State Held Unconstitutional.

The Standard Oil company, one of the several dealers in gasoline that successfully attacked the six cent a barrel inspection fee collected for a number of years by the state, joins with them in asking the supreme court not to let the state have any of the impounded fees.

When the oil companies began the action the fees provided by the law continued to be collected, but were turned into the hands of the clerk of the district court, of Omaha, where the case was filed. The state won below, but the supreme court said the law authorizing the six cent fee was unconstitutional because it provided for a fee greater than is the cost of inspection.

MARTIAL LAW IN OKLAHOMA HAS BECOME DEAD LETTER

Only a Handful of Troops Left in Either Oklahoma City or Tulsa as Walton Defeated.
Oklahoma City, Okla., Oct. 4.—The mad rush of the last few days momentarily stopped, Oklahoma tonight took stock of her position and lectured as to the future. With the court battle between Governor Walton and members of the Oklahoma house of representatives halted until next Tuesday, those whose attention has been fastened on the spectacular contest between the legislative and executive branches of the state government turned to matters that had been forced into the back ground and realized that martial law under which they had lived for nearly three weeks has become military rule virtual in name only.
