### GRAND JURY IS CALLED TODAY BY THE JUDGE

JAMES T. BEGLEY GRANTS REQUEST OF PETITIONERS FOR CONVENING OF BODR

WILL MEET ON NOVEMBER 13

D. O. DWYER NAMED BY COURT AS SPECIAL ATTORNEY AS COUNTY ATTORNEY DISQUALIFIED BY ORDER.

From Saturday's Daily—  
This morning at 10 o'clock Judge James T. Begley issued the order for the calling of a grand jury to convene at the court house here at 10 a. m., Tuesday, November 13th.

The call of the grand jury has been under contemplation for some time and petitions from a large number of the residents of the county were presented to the court several days ago requesting such action and which the court recognized as the expression of the people and accordingly called the body to meet and examine what evidence may be presented to them and return indictments if the evidence presented is sufficient to warrant such.

Judge Begley has considered the matter well and was assured by the board of county commissioners that they would be willing to stand the expense of the jury if it was deemed necessary to secure the proper enforcement of the law and the just administration of the same and the court had the expression of the people of the county in the large petitions that have been placed on file in the office of the clerk of the district court.

The session of the grand jury will be just and fair to everyone and the interests of the innocent will be pro-

ected as strongly as the inquiries into the crimes that may be charged before the body, and in the splendid just rulings of Judge Begley, the people of Cass county can find an assurance of receiving justice in every way in any matter that may come up and over which the court has jurisdiction.

At the session of open court this morning, Judge Begley entered the order disqualifying County Attorney A. G. Cole from appearing as the prosecutor before the grand jury because of business interests and also for the fact that Mr. Cole had opposed the calling of the grand jury.

As the special prosecutor to appear before the grand jury, the court named D. O. Dwyer of this city, who will have charge of the investigations and placing the evidence before the grand jury, which however can conduct their examinations and investigations themselves independent of the attorney, but in the greater part of the cases, the evidence will probably have to be submitted by the special attorney in the case.

The attorney general of the state of Nebraska has also been called by the judge to appear in the court and conduct prosecutions in the name of the people of the state of Nebraska. The court in issuing the call has placed the matter of the investigations into the crimes and offenses against the law that may be brought before the grand jury up to those who may feel that they have not received justice or who may have knowledge of the violation of law that should be given investigation by the grand jury and they should co-operate with the special prosecutor and jury in seeing that all evidence that may have a bearing on any law violations or the innocence of parties who may be charged with crime is placed before the jury.

It is not the sole purpose of the grand jury to hear the one side of the case and the court will give all those charged with offenses an opportunity of going before the jury with any evidence that may prove their innocence and have the matter thoroughly threshed out before the indictments are given out.

This jury, it may be understood, is not a body that passes on the guilt or innocence of the parties, but if the evidence is sufficient will either dismiss or vote indictments in cases that may be brought before

them. The question of the conviction or acquittal of anyone indicted by the grand jury will rest with the jury in the trial court.
