QUITE CORRECT

It is not astonishing that Ambassador Dawes, by refusing to wear silk knee breeches at a court function and appearing in the usual evening dress of an American gentleman, should draw the attention of the reporters looking for news of that colorful envoy.
Considerable facetious comment has been made on the fact that he departed from the custom adopted by some of his predecessors, who appeared in all the glory of silken knee breeches, silver buckles and the rest of the British court costume.
Gen. Dawes, however, appeared in the dress in which he would present himself at a formal function before the president in Washington. That, we take it, is the proper costume for an American ambassador to wear in a foreign court. In the United States we do not ask the British ambassador or any other diplomat to lay aside the brilliant costume of the court he represents and appear in our somber evening attire.
Why, then, should the American ambassador be expected to change the costume which custom prescribes for him to wear at home?
Our own impression is that Gen. Dawes is entirely correct, that he is doing nothing that is extraordinary but that those of his predecessors who rigged themselves out in a cheap imitation of foreign court clothes were guilty of a breach of the proprieties. And, despite a growing American affection for knickerbockers for sport wear, we think most of our citizens will admire the doughty general a little more for omitting them from his official wardrobe.—Milwaukee Sentinel.
