The fear of losing his eyesight The fear of losing his eyesight as well as ill health and his inability Death of an to carry on his work as a tailor are the reasons given for the rash act, and that the attempt at suicide was not a success is due to the fact that the failing eyesight of Mr. Smith did not permit his shooting ac-

The shooting occurred late Saturday while Smith was alone in his tailor shop in Weeping Water, the bullet entering the breast and missing his heart by only an inch. The wounded man was hurried on into Omaha and taken to the University hospital where at first it was thought that the injuries were not of a fatal nature but later peritionitis developed as the result of the rupture of an internal organ and Monday afternoon an operation was performed but little hope was held out that the man would recover.

The wounded man living in the dread of the loss of his eyesight was filled with regret that the attempt had not been successful. "I kept thinking about my wife
