

Wonderful Service of Song Offered

St. Paul's Evangelical Church Filled With Delighted Audience to Hear Prof. Steck.

The members of St. Paul's Junior Church were glad to receive the congratulations of their friends for having secured for their monthly entertainment program the services of a man of the type of Prof. G. Holt Steck of the teachers college of Peru, Nebr., and his accompanist, Miss Margaret Cain of Omaha.

Sustaining the character of the meeting as sacred song services, Prof. Holt Steck a noted chatauqua performer, proved himself to be a good "singing evangelist."

Singing the prayer of Handel's "Elijah" he guided with his voice his audience into the powerful grip of Elijah's the prophet's prayer which brought fire from heaven and then again made them tremble with the same man in the anxiety of his soul under the juniper bush.

In another number he aroused the greatest sympathy with the poor widow mother of seven children as she daily communed with her God under the tall trees, poured out her heart and gained strength for new trials.

The tension which the preceding numbers had caused was happily lifted by the song "In the Garden."

The second part contained negro spirituals and surely made the hearers feel with the race which in exchange for the torment and crucifixion of slavery gave original music to America. These were only outstanding numbers which went home to one soul, others may have been touched more by other numbers of the program.

There was an appreciative audience which too thrilled in a way they were intended for. As it was a sacred service there was no applause. Some of the most noted musicians of the town were present. Rev. McClusky of the Presbyterian church opened with a prayer and Rev. Sortor of the Methodist church gave the benediction while the audience sang before leaving "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow."

OBSERVES ANNIVERSARY

A representative of the Journal had occasion Sunday to meet Chauncey B. Walton, one of the grand old gentlemen who reside at the Masonic Home and an inquiry was made as to the residents there and their good health. Mr. Walton stated that everything was progressing as usual but let the fact creep forth he was to be eighty-one years old on January 27th. Pressed further on this matter, Mr. Walton stated that he was born on January 27th, 1849, the year of the first gold rush to California, our old friend recalling well seeing in his early days the teams of oxen, horses and mules that were hauling the wagons of the gold seekers across the plains.

In reply as to the ancestry of the Walton family, Mr. Walton stated that the name Walton was Scotch, while on his mother's side he claims descent from England, from hence his mother family, Smith, came at an early day to this country and settled in the south, where also the Walton family located, in fact George Walton, one of the delegates to congress from Georgia, signed the declaration of independence and of which our Mr. Walton is justly proud. Mr. Walton states that his grandfather Smith used to tell him when our friend was but a small lad, that his father had oft recounted how his younger brother was born on the Tuesday following independence day. The training of Mr. Walton was derived to a great extent from his grandfather Smith, who was a southern democrat and instilled into Mr. Walton the democracy of Jefferson and Jackson, and our old friend proudly stated "And I have kept the faith and when I pass over to the other shore and meet St. Peter at the pearly gates, I hope and trust he will say, 'Come in and take a seat at my right hand that has long been vacant.'"

Mr. Walton continued, "Frank, the Home like the old saying about old whiskey, 'the older it gets, the better,' so I will name two or three of the high things that enter into the Home life. First, of course, we have a real superintendent and matron to look after the affairs of the place and a force of good employes who help make things the very best and comfortable for us all. Another thing, we have a natural born barber that comes every Thursday and shaves and cuts the hair of the men and gives the men and women alike the best of service that could be found in New York or Denver. He can give the ladies any kind of a bob that they may wish and the Home pays the whole bill for us."

"Then the librarians donate their time every alternate Wednesday morning to come to the Home with books and a smile as well and a glad hand for everybody. I have a book No. 17,211, so I guess that they must have 18,000 volumes to loan."
