Notorious Imposter Arrested After a Year

Samuel Weinberg Taken to Prison to Begin Serving Term - Fooled President

New York, Feb. 27.—An international imposter, who once gained the confidence of president of the United States, was arrested today after being sought for almost a year to begin service of a prison term for practicing law without license.

Samuel Weinberg, alias Lieutenant Sterling G. Wyman, was arrested today as he walked down Broadway, imslaven, a sandwich wrapped in a newspaper under his arm and in his pocket two alleged certified and collected checks for \$2,500,000 which he said he was going to show to people to indicate the extent of his financial operations.

Taken before the court of special sessions Weinberg was ordered taken immediately to the penitentiary to begin serving his six months to three years sentence.

In 1922 Weinberg, as Lieutenant Wyman, convinced President Harding that he was a bona fide naval lieutenant and personal representative of "Princess Patricia," a lady who claimed to be a Turkish princess but wasn't. He obtained an audience for her with the president.

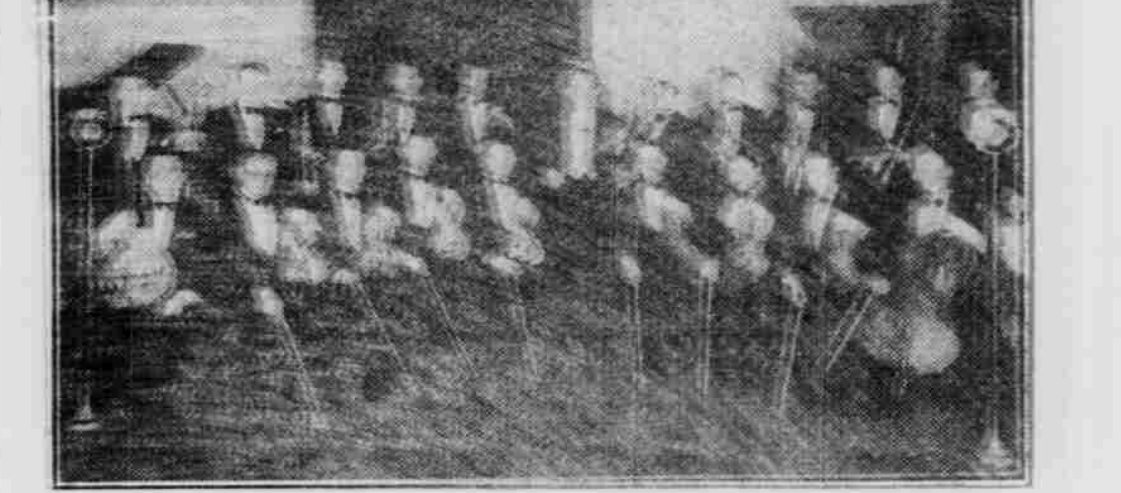
