The American Farm Bureau Federation has prepared a plan that offers valuable suggestions to localities seeking to replace their present muddy, semi-impassable farm roads with year-round, improved secondary

First, a road committee must be ormed. Then, by working with the county engineer, the state highway engineer, or the United States Bureau of Roads, it can plan a serviceable and economical high-Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Meisinger way system for its locality.

The type of road surface to be used varies with local conditions and materials available. Grading and draining are practically the same for any type of improved surface. In many parts of the country it has been found that one form or another of asphalt or oil gives satisfactory results in providing a low cost waterproof surface for secondary roads.

There has been too much hit-andmiss and "political" road building, resulting in waste. Farming areas can be given good roads in a reasonable length of time if the problem is scientifically studied and worked out along practical lines.
