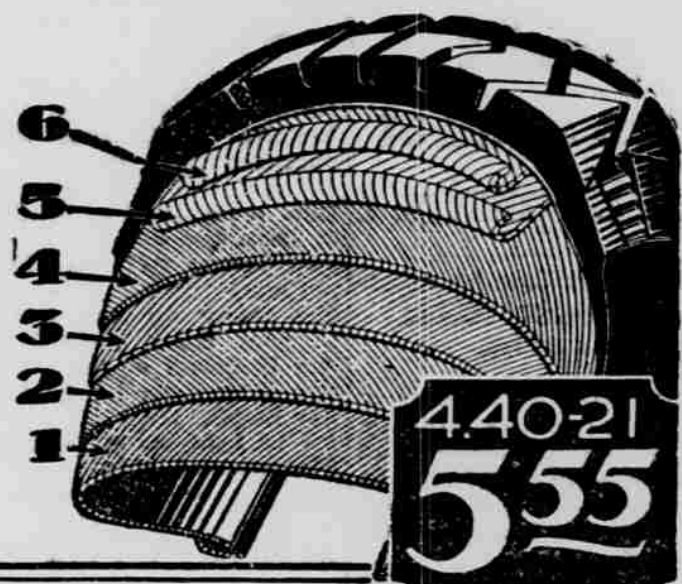

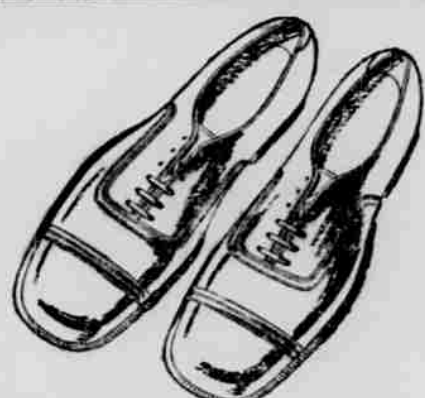

## Woods Brothers Net Earnings Up

Increases Half Million During the Last Twelve Months—Earnings \$5.09 a Share

Net earnings available for preferred and common stock dividends after all charges including federal income taxes of Woods Brothers Corporation, largest inland waterways engineers in the United States, for the twelve months ended June 30, 1930, totaled \$1,197,273 as against \$635,551 for the same period last year, an increase of \$561,722. These earnings are equivalent to \$5.09 a share on 167,788 common shares outstanding on June 30 this year as against \$3.59 a share on \$3,893 shares in the previous year. Woods Brothers common stock was reclassified two shares for one on Feb. 11 this year. Gross profit amounted to \$2,490,300 as against \$1,886,057, increase of \$604,243.

Mark W. Woods, president, stated that the company started operations on Jan. 1 this year with \$5,100,000 of contracts on hand, as against only \$600,000 on Jan. 1, 1929. Business for the last three months of 1930 was particularly good, he stated, whereas the first half year is usually the company's slack season.
