Legion Posts Start to Combat Bank Robbers.
 Greenwood Veterans Meet With Sheriff and State Authorities to Organize for Work.

Carrying out the plan of State Commander Marcus Potec of the American Legion, which suggests the various posts of the organization over the state co-operate with officials in striving to check the ravages of bank robbers, the various posts over the county are now getting busy.

Last evening Sheriff Bert Reed was at Greenwood to meet with Col. Phil Hall, himself a victim of the gang that looted the First National Bank of Lincoln, to assist in getting the Legion members lined up on this proposition. The Legion post at Greenwood is located in an important position to give some very effective aid to the law enforcing officers as their town is located on the D. L. D. main highway from Omaha to Lincoln, and as they have no extensive law enforcing departments in that section the volunteer leaders can do a great deal of good in case of any robberies, in capturing the robbers.

The matter was thoroughly discussed and the live wire Greenwood Legion men will in the future be on the job to see what aid is possible in checking the work of the bank robbers in this part of the state.

The Plattsmouth Legion post has under consideration similar plans that would provide for emergency service in case of a robbery or attempted robbery, and give added protection in the city as well as providing outposts along the highways who could assist in preventing the escape of the robbers in case they should visit this section. Here the Platte and Missouri rivers offer a fine place for the outposts as well at points along the highway west and south of the city and over which robbers operating in this section would likely operate.

The legion activities would be under the supervision of the county officers in the various counties as the state sheriff's office cannot handle the matter as effectively as local officers and have no authority to deputize the special guards while the county sheriff may in the case of emergencies.

Bad Check Artist and Sneak Thieves Make Things Lively in West Cass County Town.

On Tuesday of last week a stranger entered the drug store of Ernest F. Smith at Greenwood, and making a purchase of a coca cola, and asked if he could use the telephone for a moment. He went to the directory and looked through it, but did not call. After securing a number of blank checks, saying he was a collector, he left, and must have made good time for after about three hours a call came from Omaha to the Greenwood State bank saying that Mr. E. F. Smith was at Hayden's and wanted to make some purchases and was offering his personal check in payment. Mr. Miller of the bank, stepped into the drug store and found Mr. Smith and immediately rushed back to the phone at the bank, saying, hold the man, he is a fraud. But he had made his escape, however.

Others were not so fortunate, for at Orchard & Wilhelm at Omaha, he had purchased two pillows which he had sent to Mr. Smith, and issued a check for \$7.50, taking the change and also another check was negotiated at Thompson & Beiden's for \$3.95. Mr. Smith sent the pillows back and will not honor the checks.

About the same time some one entered the cellar of Fred Hackney a number of miles north of Greenwood and took some fifteen gallons of lard. And to cap the climax a person canvassing saying he was working for a Lincoln cleaning house secured a good rug of Rex Peters, which he was to clean for fifty cents and return the following day, was not heard of again. When a telephone call was made to the house in Lincoln, the house said they had no one on the road in the vicinity of Greenwood.

 Notice is hereby given that the Legislature of Nebraska by an act passed by a three-fifths vote of the members elected to each house has submitted to the electors of the state to be voted on at the general election to be held November 4, 1930, a proposal that Section 7 of Article XII of the Constitution of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:
 "Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors over and above the amount of stock by him held to an amount equal to his respective stock or shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing or existing while he remains such stockholder, and all banking corporations shall publish quarterly statements under oath of their assets and liabilities. The stockholders shall become individually responsible for the liability hereby imposed, immediately after any such banking corporation, or banking institution shall be adjudged insolvent, and the receiver of said corporation or institution shall have full right and lawful authority, as such receiver, forthwith to proceed by action in court to collect such liabilities; and the provisions of Section 4, Article XII, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska shall not be construed as applying to banking corporations or banking institutions."

The above proposed amendment to be voted upon at the general election November 4, 1930, is published in accordance with Section 3087, Chapter 112, Session Laws 1925, State of Nebraska.

 Notice is hereby given that the Legislature of Nebraska by a three-fifths vote of the members elected to each house has submitted to the electors of the state for approval or rejection at the general election to be held November 4, 1930, a proposal to amend Section 3 of Article XIII of the Constitution of Nebraska, to read as follows:
 "The credit of the state shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association, or corporation. The state legislature, however, in order to help pay any deficit in the Depositors Guaranty Fund and to discharge the obligations thereof to depositors in banks closed by the Department of Trade and Commerce prior to December 31, 1931, may appropriate out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of eight million dollars or as much thereof as may be deemed necessary, and such appropriation shall be deemed to be for a public purpose, namely, to relieve distress and prevent suffering and to stabilize and strengthen the state banking system."
