"Section 3. The credit of the state shall never be given or loaned in aid of any individual, association, or corporation. The state legislature, however, in order to help pay any deficit in the Depositors Guaranty Fund and to discharge the obligations thereof to depositors in banks closed by the Department of Trade and Commerce prior to December 31, 1931, may appropriate out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of eight million dollars or as much thereof as may be deemed necessary, and such appropriation shall be deemed to be for a public purpose, namely, to relieve distress and prevent suffering and to stabilize and strengthen the state banking system."

The above proposed amendment to be voted upon at the general election November 4, 1930, is published in accordance with Section 3087, Chapter 112, Session Laws 1925, State of Nebraska.
