**Slayings Acc-company Election in Kentucky**  
Fatal Rows Take Place in Widely Scattered Parts of State; Count of Votes Delayed.

Louisville, Ky.—Four men were killed and another wounded in widely scattered election rows in Kentucky Tuesday as ballots were cast for United States senator and representatives. While the contest for the senate was intense and a hard fight was waged in several congressional precincts, no reports indicated an unusually heavy vote. Tabulation will not be started until Wednesday under a new law designed to purify the ballot.

The weather was generally fair, thus adding to the chances of bringing out the republican vote in the mountains for John M. Robison, seeking the long and short term in the senate.

**Fervor Causes Fatalities.**  
Two fatalities, those on Stinking creek in Knox county were reported to have been the direct result of election fervor, a democratic worker having reproached a farmer for voting the republican ticket, Boyd Bingham, forty, the election worker, killed Hampton Smith, forty-five, a farmer, and in turn was shot by the latter's son.

Ward Hatfield, thirty-five, was slain in Pike county. Officers arrested Elias Dotson, fifty, and said an old quarrel between the two had arisen while they were working in the election.

At Danville, Joseph Hayden, democratic challenger, shot and killed Ed Donahy, a negro, who came to the polls announcing he had heard there was trouble and he proposed to settle it. Hayden was released on \$1,000 bond and returned to his duties, several witnesses stating he fired in self defense and beat Donahy to the draw. In a quarrel at Elkhorn, in Pike county, Adam Cotter, a former deputy sheriff, was shot but not seriously injured, by Booker Wright.—State Journal.

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**LOCAL NEWS**  
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**Hoover's Job Finding Organization Shows Costs Lower; England Wars on Unemployment**  
Washington—President Hoover's job-finding organization Monday moved to stimulate public works construction by pointing out economies of 9 to 20 per cent available for work initiated immediately. Simultaneously three more names were added to the group to alleviate unemployment suffering.

In announcing the conclusion of a survey designed to show whether federal, state, and local governments could economize by building extensively at the present time, Chairman Woods of the president's emergency employment committee said it had shown that "substantial savings to the taxpayers" would result. The survey included data gathered from three government departments and covered various types of construction in all sections of the country.

**Bids on Work Lower.**  
Frank Bane of Richmond, the commissioner of public welfare in Virginia, was the first named Monday by Colonel Woods to aid in his task of job-finding. Bane will act as regional director, supervising unemployment relief in the southern section comprised of Virginia, Maryland, Tennessee, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi.

James C. Lawrence, the dean of administration of the University of Minnesota, was named by the unemployment chairman to act as a "clearing house for regional directors." The third name added to the list of workers Monday was that of John W. Flynn of Prescott, Ariz.

In discussing the survey of possible construction economies, Colonel Woods said the supervising architects of the treasury had reported present construction bids at various points east of the Mississippi averaged between 14 and 15 per cent below 1929 estimates, with greater economies on smaller buildings.

**Miss Abbott Urges Speed.**  
Army officials, he said, reported decreases averaging about 9 per cent per cubic foot in the costs of dwellings constructed since 1929, while the bureau of public roads found roadbuilding contracts could be let in many cases at decreases of from 10 to 15 per cent.

Meanwhile, Miss Grace Abbott, chief of the children's bureau, in a message to Dr. Lillian Gilbreth, in charge of the women's section of the president's emergency employment committee, urged a speeding up of relief, saying: "We must get the children out of the bread line and no child must suffer in the United States."—State Journal.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 3.—The hazards of hard riding in filming western thrillers during his early screen career have placed Tom Mix, film cowboy, in the Hollywood hospital for treatment of his back, injured in a fall from his horse several years ago. Last Thursday Mix was at Agua Caliente, Mex., preparing for a fast aerial trip to Natchez, Miss., to face a 50 thousand dollar breach of contract suit there Friday. He said severe pain in his back forced cancellation of the flight and postponement of the trial.

Mix returned to Los Angeles Saturday night Dr. R. Nichols Smith sent him to the hospital.

The film cowboy was able to undergo X-ray photographing and was declared much improved today.

Dr. Smith said no serious condition had been found and the trouble will be determined definitely tomorrow.

**Annual Crime Toll is Set at 16 Billions**  
Each Criminal Costs as Much as Welfare of 160 Boys, Estimate—Report Is Filed

Washington, D. C., Nov. 3.—The opinion that every criminal in the United States costs as much "in welfare" as the lives of 160 normal boys" was advanced today by a youth committee in a report prepared for the White House child conference.

This conclusion was reached from estimating the annual crime bill in excess of 16 billion dollars, the annual child welfare cost at five billion dollars, the number of criminals at less than one million and that child welfare affects 50 million youths.

**Storm of Fury Over the English Chanel Arises**  
Shipping Endangered, Number Persons Injured and Considerable Property Loss

London.—A storm which caused considerable damage and injured a number of persons tore at the English channel and the southern and midland counties of England Sunday. The cross channel steamer Maid of Orleans reported four passengers injured when a great wave struck her while she was enroute from Boulogne to Folkestone. Two windows on the port side of the ship were stove in.

The Essex shore near the mouth of the Thames was struck by a miniature tornado. Motor cars were blown over in the streets, pedestrians were thrown down, several roofs were stripped down, and large trees were uprooted. The wind continued at tornado violence for only two or three minutes, but an extraordinary heavy thunderstorm, with sleet and rain, continued over the area all day.

The Greek steamer Menelios signaled during the afternoon that she was very seriously damaged, messaging from two miles south of St. Catherine's Point, Isle of Wight. A lifeboat put out from shore and was standing by late in the day. From other points on the southern coast came reports of barges and other small craft in trouble and of rescues by lifeboats or motorboats. No loss of life had been reported early in the night.

That the gale extends across the southern North sea was disclosed by Lloyd's report from Flushing, saying the British brigantine Cecilia was stranded in stormy weather on a sandbank off the harbor. Her topmasts were torn to shreds and marine authorities said she probably would be wrecked if her anchors gave way. Lloyd's report said, however, that the captain refused assistance.

Paris.—Fierce storms struck Paris Sunday, causing the death of two men and injuries to many. One man was killed by a falling electric light pole and another in a different part of the city by a falling chimney. Seven injured were taken to hospitals. Property damage was heavy.
