Revolt Vanishes in Legislature;

Kier Named Speaker in House; Candidates Voted as Group-One Member Absent

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 6 .- The rebel-4,857.41 lions spirit which had been evidenced by a half dozen republican members of the house vanished at the opening gavel of the forty-seventh session of the legislature Tuesday noon, and the republican organization rode safely into power in both houses. Representative Max Kier of Lincoln was installed in the speaker's chair in the house by a vote of 52 to 47 over the democratic candidate,

Of the 53 republican members of the house, it remained for a new iod, are active this week in that dismember, Fred G. Action a Surprise.

Mason's action came as a complete surprise, and later, with a twinkle in his eyes, he ventured the opinion that he had thought it might. In response to inquiries as to whe-

ther his vote might indicate the general course of his future actions, he would only say "I am down here to represent the folks back home." He indicated that he would support any measure to reduce taxes and added that he is "not married to the

He attacked the direct primary system as having "increased expenses, lessened the interest of the people, increased scandals, and produced a larger quota of demagogues. He added that experiments with the initiative, referendum and recall have also been disappointing.
