Celebrate Golden Wedding Date

Mr. and Mrs. Frank H. Stander Observe Occasion at Omaha—Long Time Manley Residents

A golden wedding celebration given in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Frank H. Stander, 136 North Fortieth street, Omaha, Monday, which opened with a reception and dinner at noon at the residence, was concluded by a card party and dance in the evening at the Knights of Columbus club with a hundred relatives and friends as guests.

Mr. and Mrs. Stander are the same age, 72. After marriage at Plattsmouth in 1881 they lived for 40 years on a farm near Manley, Neb. They have since lived in Omaha.

Six daughters were present at the celebration Monday: Miss Lena Stander, Mrs. Mike Honer and Mrs. Walter O'Brien of Manley, and Mrs. Susan Bickert and Miss Lillian Stander of Omaha. Two sons are John of Trenton, Neb., and Frank, who lives on the old home place near Manley. There are also 16 grandchildren.

The best man and bride's maid at the wedding 50 years ago also attended the festivities Monday. They were James Stander of Louisville, Neb., a cousin of Mr. Stander, and Mrs. Chris Mockenhaupt of Manley, a sister of Mrs. Stander.

Death of Pioneer Resident of Mills County

Benjamin K. Windham, Brother of the Late Robert B. Windham, Dies in Illinois Home

Benjamin Karnes Windham was born a Sr. Joseph, Mo., March 2, 1849, and passed away at Elmhurst, Ill., on December 30, 1930, aged 81 years, 9 months and 28 days.

He was the second son of Benjamin and Elizabeth Windham, who were pioneers of Mills county, having moved to this locality with their young family in 1855. Mr. Windham passed his boyhood in Glenwood, grew to young manhood there and was one of the substantial and upright citizens of this community during the greater part of his long and active life.

On October 18, 1876, he was united in marriage to Inez Shinn. To them were born four daughters and one son. Surviving members of the family are Mrs. Windham and two daughters, Hattie (Mrs. A. C. Bonham) and Mary Elizabeth (Mrs. Fred L. Petty). Three grandchildren and numerous nephews mourn his passing. He was a brother of Hon. R. B. Windham, long time resident here and who preceded him in death.

Mr. Windham united with the Methodist church of Glenwood 58 years ago. When he moved from this community eight years ago he had a record of 50 years continuous membership in this church, in the work of which he and his family were actively identified.

As a young man Mr. Windham was engaged in the varied work of the then frontier community of Mills county, such as overland freighting, and railroad building. Later he was engaged in the grain and elevator business in Glenwood and for many years in the ice business.

In 1922 he moved from Glenwood to engage in business in Council Bluffs. During the past two and a half years he has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Fred L. Petty, at Elmhurst, Ill.

Some five weeks ago he became ill and was taken to a hospital where he underwent an operation and for a time it appeared that he would regain his former vigor, but owing to his advanced years other complications arose and in spite of all that medical science and loving care could do he passed away Tuesday. The body was brought to Glenwood, accompanied by Mrs. Windham and Mr. and Mrs. Petty.

Funeral services were held at Glenwood in the Raynor chapel Wednesday afternoon conducted by Rev. J. F. Arnold of the Glenwood Methodist church, assisted by Rev. E. E. Goodrich, who had personally known Mr. Windham for many years, and who paid a beautiful tribute to him as a worthy citizen and a Christian gentleman.

Music for the service was furnished by Mrs. George Masters, Mrs. W. E. McCoy, Clarence Day and Leo Severne with Mrs. Frank Kemp at the piano.

The pallbearers were Chas. Record, T. Q. Records, H. M. Logan, A. B. Walling, S. F. Vinton and John Marley.

Interment was made in the Glenwood cemetery. Those from a distance attending the funeral services besides Mrs. Windham and Mr. and Mrs. Fred L. Petty of Elmhurst, Ill., were: Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Omaha—Mrs. Helen Tobin, twenty-six, Omaha, late Monday night was shot and probably fatally wounded by her estranged husband, David Tobin, a federal informer, Tobin escaped.

Police learned that Tobin had been employed as a federal informer for the past ten days. He and his wife had separated before that time but a reconciliation appeared imminent until she learned of his federal work, they said.

Mrs. Tobin, police stated, had several times phoned operators of Omaha speakeries and warned them that her husband was securing evidence for raids.

Federal officers said he told them that his wife was operating a speakery and asked that they raid her apartment. He was told that a raid could not be made until a warrant was secured.

About an hour later, Tobin entered his wife's apartment, and after a brief, spirited verbal battle he shot her twice.

LUCAS TELLS OF NUTT LOAN

Washington, Jan. 6.—Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the Republican national committee, told the Nye committee Tuesday that Joseph R. Nutt, committee treasurer, recently loaned him \$3,500 to pay off the debts he contracted in fighting Senator Norris, western Nebraska insurgent.

Despite this loan from Nutt, however, Lucas still insisted the national committee had nothing to do with the fight on Norris. He said it was his personal expenditure and that he intended to repay Nutt.

Lucas said he used the \$3,500 to pay off the balance of a \$4,000 note with which he expected to pay for anti-Norris literature during the fall campaign. The discovery since then that Lucas paid for this undercover material has threatened to split the Republican party.

Nutt is expected to testify Wednesday. The fact that Nutt loaned Lucas the funds to pay off the note indicated the committee treasurer approves the fight made by Lucas to read Norris

out of the Republican party. This loan was made since Lucas made his previous appearance before the committee on Dec. 19.

The anti-Norris campaign was tied up a little closer to the national committee when the witness admitted he used the lists of precinct workers at Republican headquarters in sending out the undercover literature.
