Gandhi Decides Will Wear Pants While in London

And May Shave Off Chutia, But Will Not Don Starched Shirt; No Knee Breeches.

Amritsar, India, April 9.—Mahatma Gandhi, making his plans today for his forthcoming visit to London for the second round table conference on an Indian constitutional status, said that he had decided to wear pants in the British capital after all.

Discarding his first intention of appearing there attired only in loin cloth and shawl, he said that if the weather is sufficiently cool he will wear ordinary European trousers.

He indicated that it was even possible that he would appear at the round table sessions with his pig-tail, or chutia, shaved off. The chutia is a long tust of hair worn religiously by Hindus, whose popular interpretation of the mode is that it enables friends, when the wearer dies, to pull him out of hell. Gandhi wears a chutia habitually, although otherwise he is bald.

Although deciding to wear trousers in London, Gandhi said that he would not submit to a white starched shirt and would decline to attend any formal public banquets. Neither will he wear the silk knee breeches which are de rigueur for appearances before the king at Buckingham palace.

"No, thanks," he said, "I am ugly enough without such foppery. I was never made to be ornamental." Gandhi, who is suffering from exhaustion as a consequence of his labors since release from prison, did not leave his residence here today.

He remained in his room, receiving city officials and representatives of the local nationalist congress chapter, and making them a brief speech. The mahatma has developed a temperature slightly above normal.—World-Herald.

OIL PLAN GETS APPROVAL

Washington—The administration approved the efforts at stabilization of the oil industry which are being made by the ten principal petroleum producing states. Both thru the federal oil conservation board composed of four cabinet members and in a conference at the white house the president and his aides commended the program presented by the oil states advisory committee.

This group, headed by C. C. Murray, cousin of Governor Murray of Oklahoma, laid before the conservation board Thursday morning a plan by which it will continue to function as an advisor and guide to both the industry and the states while the latter are working toward enactment of a compact which will make it possible to limit the production of oil in all fields proportionately. The aim is to bring supply into relation to demand, reduce steadily the present enormous storage of oil and gasoline above ground, restore prices to a point at which the hundreds of thousands of small wells can continue to exist, and thru saving of independent operators from bankruptcy, preserve competitive conditions in the nation's second largest industry. Prices, however, were not mentioned at the session.

ADVANCE AUTO RISK BILL

Lincoln, April 9.—Upholding the theory that Nebraska highways should be cleared of careless and reckless drivers and that the public should be protected from irresponsible autoists, the house of representatives Thursday advanced to third reading the Schepman senate proposal.

The act provides that motorists involved in traffic accidents resulting in damage to property, loss of life, or injury, shall protect the public from future mishaps by taking some form of liability protection.

In revising the bill the house concurred in the theory of Representative R. E. Emerson (R.) of Lexington that the clause restricting autoists from the operation of their cars pending the payment of a judgment was too severe.

That section was subsequently

stricken by a vote of 38 to 24.

A subsequent motion by Representative Tom Martin (D.) to delete from the bill the requirement that upon suspension of a driver's license he should forfeit his auto license plates and registration certificates as also sustained.

An amendment offered by Representative Trenmore Cone (D.) of Valley to fix the maximum penalty at \$1,000 for operating a car after the license had been suspended was rejected, 28 to 30.

As the law stands the penalty is from \$100 to \$1,000.
