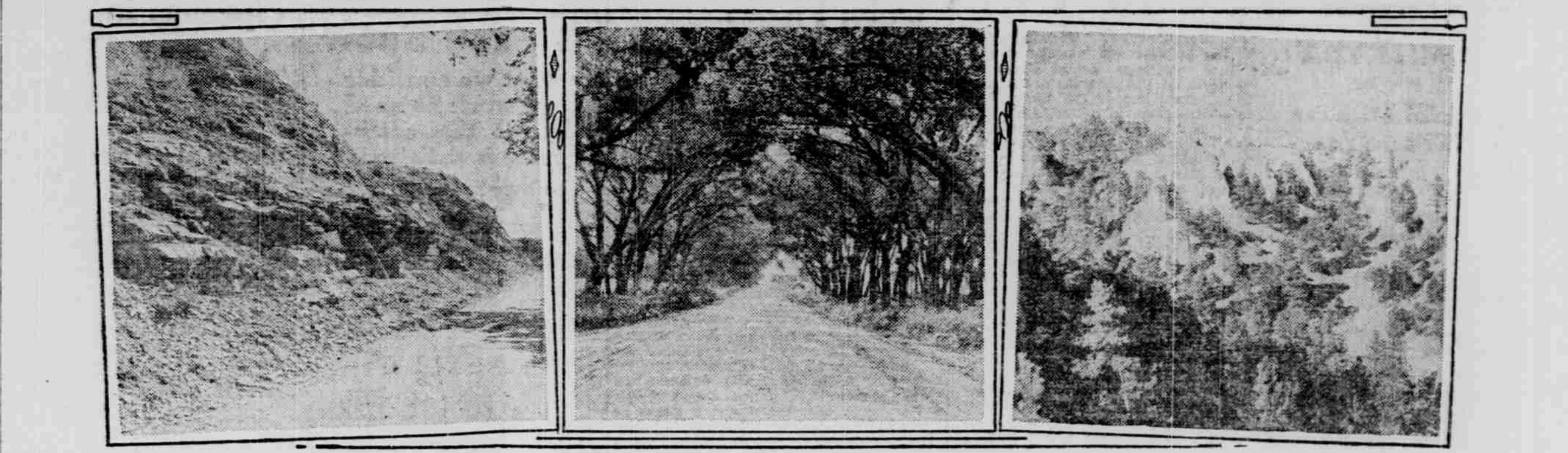

200 Guests at Luncheon on the 86th Floor

Given by Al Smith on Dedication of World's Tallest Building; Button by Hoover

New York, May 1.—The world's tallest structure—the Empire State building—was dedicated and opened today—a final realization of the long labors of former Governor Alfred E. Smith and a group of business associates.

The structure stands at Fifth avenue and Thirty-fourth street on a site formerly occupied by the old Waldorf-Astoria hotel.

State and city dignitaries, leaders of industry and of the city's professional and educational life participated in the dedication of the 86-story building and its dirigible mast towering another 16 stories into the sky.

Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt hailed the structure as an achievement for his state. Mayor James J. Walker did the same for the city. Ex-Governor Smith, his associates and the building craft received congratulations for erecting the 1,250-foot edifice.

At 11:45 a. m. President Hoover pressed a telegraph key in the White House, turning on all lights illuminating the skyscraper.

There was music, speechmaking and entertainment. At noon, two hundred guests of Mr. Smith set a record for lofty eating at a luncheon in the eighty-sixth floor observatory.

Because of the building's tall mooring mast, Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, U. S. N., newly appointed captain of the dirigible Akron, now under construction, was one of the guest speakers.

The opening took place at 11:30 when Mary Adams Warner, daughter of the head of the New York state police, and Arthur Smith, Jr., grandchildren of the former governor, cut the ribbon across the main entrance on Fifth avenue.

The general public will be admitted tomorrow, when tenants officially open their offices for business.

The building has 63 passenger elevators, 6,400 windows and contains 60 thousand tons of steel. Construction work was started March 17, 1930.—World-Herald.

PORTUGUESE FORCES BOMBARDING FUNCHAL

Lisbon, April 29.—Fighting between the government expeditionary force and the rebels in control of the city of Funchal, Madeira, began again this afternoon, it was learned tonight.

The Portuguese government warships, according to the report, reopened the bombardment of Funchal after a truce which began yesterday afternoon, and landed forces on the island.

RAILROAD JOBS GAIN IN IOWA

Des Moines, May 1.—A gain of 14.6 per cent in employment in railroad car shops topped all Iowa industries in the April report of the state labor bureau Friday.

The gain was made by replacing former employes in temporary positions, the report said. Other divisions which showed increases were lumber products, with a seasonal gain of 2.1 per cent, and chemical compounds with 7.5 per cent.

Employment conditions as a whole in the state declined 1.4 per cent in April. The report attributed this slight loss to "an effort to cut down overhead and production during this so-called slack purchasing period."

The depression has retarded the opening up of seasonal industries that under normal conditions should show increased activity at this time," the report continued.

Operating schedules have been held up during the winter and early spring months in an effort to provide part time employment to the greatest possible number of employes."

May Day Marked by No Serious Disturbances

Though in Many Population Centers Police Precaution Taken; Some Minor Disorders

Many parts of the world took police precautions yesterday to see that May day—often called "International Labor Day"—passed without violence or disorder.

Young communists were blamed for the shooting in Berlin of a policeman.

Police and communists came together in Adelaide and Brisbane, Australia, six arrests being made in Adelaide and 20 in Brisbane.

In Union square, New York City, and Boston Common—public places where group gatherings are frequent—divided their time between various factions. In Union square time was allotted to former service men, socialists and communists.

The Common was the gathering place of patriots, communists and school children.

Hamilton Fish, jr., New York congressman who has been active in seeking legislation restricting communism, was one of the Boston speakers. Special police details were stationed at Boston Common and Union square, New York, although police officials expressed no fear of trouble.

Three thousand strikers paraded in Bombay, India, without disorders ensuing.

In Russia and Spain the day had special significance, taking the form of a national celebration in Spain because of the recent establishment of a republic there. Russia particularly made much of the day, the soviet regarding May day as one of its principal holidays.

LAYS ECONOMIC CRISIS TO GOLD DISTRIBUTION

Berlin, April 29.—"Not the gold standard as such, but the faulty distribution of gold over the world is the chief cause of the world economic crisis," Dr. Hans Luther, president of the reichsbank told the stockholders at the annual meeting today, thereby adding his voice to the new chorus urging re-examination of the reparations problem.

IRRIGATORS FORM GROUP

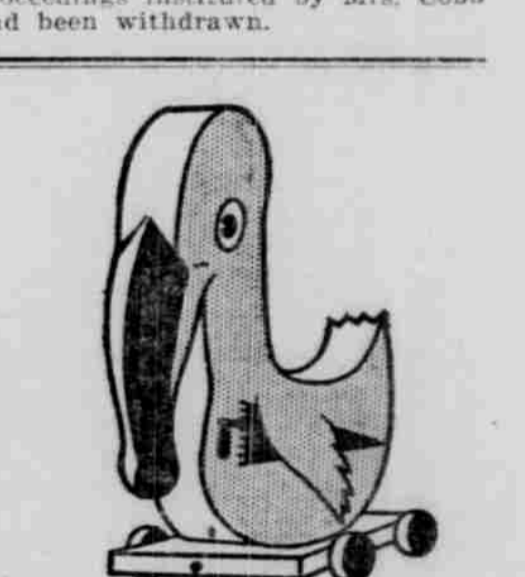
McCook—A Reservoir and Irrigation association has been organized here to promote work in the Republican river valley between McCook and Indianola. Preliminary plans for water rights are to be made at once.

The new association is a branch of the Twin Valley association which has been promoting the work for some time. Samuel G. Porter, veteran irrigation man of this region and project engineer for the Twin Valleys association, spoke at the organization meeting of the branch group.

He has now completed preliminary survey work from Colorado east to Superior. He has divided the project into nine districts, of which the McCook-Indianola stretch is one. In each he has located sites for dams and reservoirs. The job of obtaining water rights will be up to the district organizations.
