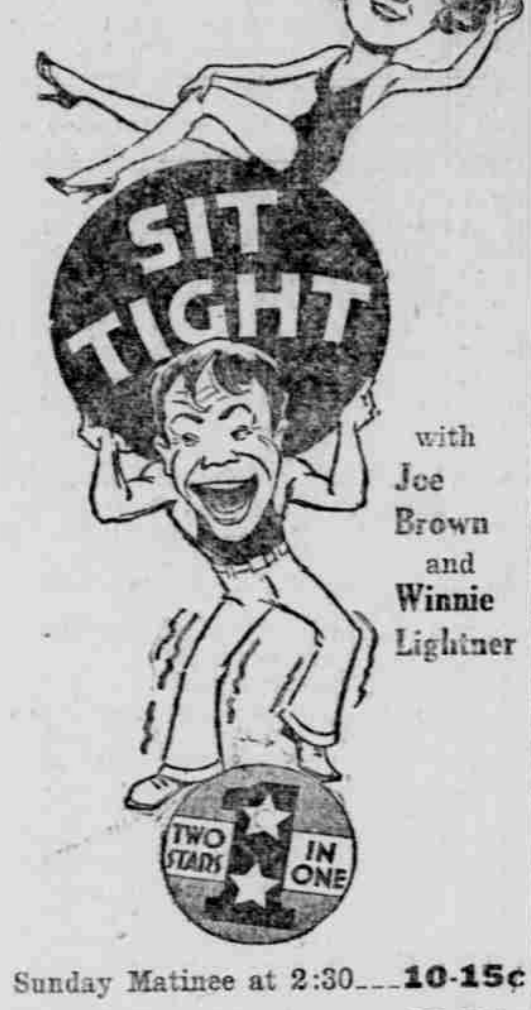

The law for testing and retarding cattle for tuberculosis will be enforced where legal petitions are presented but not when petitions are illegal...

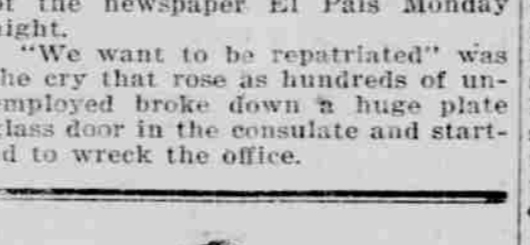

Woman Lies in Coma Following Shooting

Younger Brother Is Found Dead With Gun by Side Blamed in Denmark Tragedy.

Grand Island—Miss Nellie Nielsen of near Daneshweg, was still unconscious in a hospital here early Tuesday night, suffering from wounds authorities believed were inflicted by her younger brother, Andrew. The shooting occurred in the morning, and a search of the Nielsen farm revealed the body of Andrew, his skull pierced by a revolver bullet, and a gun by his side.

At 5 p. m., about ten hours after the attack and four hours after an operation had been performed in the hope of saving the woman's life, she had not regained consciousness. Attending physicians held out little hope for her recovery.

Physicians said they believed Miss Nielsen had been struck on the head about a dozen times with a bludgeoning instrument. She also was shot twice thru the brain, the attendants said.

Neighbors said their father was temporarily deranged. The man and woman had lived on the farm alone since the death of their father about fifteen years ago. Their mother had died previously. A step-sister, Mrs. Alvin Bredstheer of Columbus, was at her sister's side Tuesday night, but was on the verge of a breakdown, and was not told the details of the case.

Investigation of the case still was in progress. Howard county officers said they had not yet decided whether there will be an inquest. The weapon which was used in the attack of Miss Nielsen had not been found late Tuesday, but search still continued.

The tragedy was discovered by Walter Delahoyde, Grand Island electrician, who entered the house soon after 8 o'clock in the morning to complete a job of wiring the house. Delahoyde said Andrew had helped with the wiring Monday night and that there was nothing unusual in his demeanor.

Friends and neighbors said Andrew was subject to periods of temporary derangement for many years. These spells, they said, had become more numerous and more severe in recent years. During the periods, they said, he often was moved to violence.—State Journal.

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SEA DISASTER REPORTED

London—Brief dispatches from Moscow and Riga brought to London the news that the Russian submarine No. 6 of the Baltic fleet had sunk last Friday during maneuvers in the gulf of Finland. The sinking of the submarine was supposed to have been due to an explosion aboard.

No detailed official report of the disaster seems to have been made by the Russian government, which has given no report on the location of the submarine. The only indication of the spot was furnished here by a message from Riga which placed it roughly at latitude 59 north and longitude 24 east. There was no indication as to how many men made up the crew of the submarine or how large the casualty list might be.

Finds Religion Losing Ground in the Nation

Dr. Clarence True Wilson finds the Methodist Church losing in Membership.

Dr. Clarence True Wilson, chairman of the church board of public morals and temperance in an interview at Washington, D. C., published in the Times, takes a very dark view of the present religious aspect of the nation and especially as to its church.

A great revival of religion is needed to put the nation back on its moral feet, said Wilson. An interest in observation of the law must be created or the law will fail, he declared.

"I am not pessimistic. But no one could but realize that we are faced with a serious condition in the nation today," he said.

"The church is losing its authority. The Methodist church, which for generations has been growing, is being overtaken and taking its place in the world, is losing ground."

"In the past two years we have lost more than 50,000 members, instead of going out in the field and building more churches, we are consolidating churches."

"Where there were three churches before, there are now found in many cases but one, he said. The others have been closed and the property sold."

"And we find that the one church that has resulted from the consolidation has no greater strength than it had before."

"The colleges are falling in giving the moral background they have before. Boys and girls are sent away to get an education in church schools. They return home skeptical."

"There is no more the self sacrifice of devotion on the part of the wealthy. When we were working on the cause of prohibition, people of wealth were generous. They gave large donations to the cause."

"Now they give little or nothing. The church people are not contributing one half of the amount they gave 10 years ago to the anti-saloon league."

"For the past six years the benevolences of the Methodist church have been off \$500,000 year."

Despite all this, Dr. Wilson thinks that the "better part" of the American nature will rise triumphant over the conditions. He said:

"What we need now is a great moral leader. We need another Martin Luther. We need another John Wesley. We need great evangelists."

"The drinking of today, Dr. Wilson feels, is still merely a fad."

"Many people drink to show their contempt for the law. Law generally wins out."

"I firmly believe that we will win through this trying time. But it will take faith and hard work. It will call for self sacrifice and devotion. Those are necessary virtues are to keep the law unchanged."

PANTAGES TRIAL ON TODAY

San Diego—On the eve of trial of Alexander Pantages and others on charges growing out of alleged operations in the "girl market," defense and prosecution attorneys predicted hot legal engagements over motions by three of four defendants to separate trials.

The contest will open at 9 a. m. Monday and also only an hour was allowed on the court calendar for the prelude to the trial both sides admitted it might occupy most of the day.

Pantages, once convicted but later granted a new trial on a charge of criminally assaulting Eunice Pringle, a young dancer in Los Angeles, is a co-defendant with Jesse H. Shreve, San Diego business man, and William Jobelman and Olive Clark Day. The latter two persons are alleged operators of the "girl market."

Conspiracy and violations of the juvenile court law are charged.

DOCTOR KILLED IN A DUEL

New York—Dr. Joseph T. Loughlin, a Brooklyn surgeon, was shot to death in what police say was a duel with a man whom the doctor accused of carrying gossip to his wife. The physician's body was found in a vacant lot in Brooklyn, a bullet behind the right ear and two in the body. His wife claimed the body at the morgue. The doctor's expensive automobile was discovered near the lot in which the body was found. Dr. Loughlin left his home at 13 p. m. Saturday, police said, accompanied by a cousin, Howard Bridgetts, a broker. Mrs. Loughlin told police the doctor had challenged Bridgetts to come out and "fight it out." The doctor did not return. Police are seeking Bridgetts for questioning.
