## Governor's New Budget is Lower Than First One

**Assembly in Special Session to Iron Out Finances—Explains His Stand.**

Lincoln, Neb., June 9.—Governor Bryan presented a new budget plan to the special session of the Nebraska legislature this afternoon which varied only a few thousand dollars in the total amount of appropriations from that which he recommended last January. Actually, the new budget plan is \$4,829 less than the first one.

Despite this slight reduction, he so shifted individual items as to meet, he stated, in an adequate manner, the needs of the state institutions. These items, were the cause of the regular session deadlock.

This was accomplished by trimming the amounts he had previously recommended for the purchase of supplies, food and clothing for the institutions during the next two years. The trimming process yielded close to a half million dollars, and that surplus was turned to new buildings and repairs.

**"Business Proposition."**  
The governor urged the members to lay aside "partisanship and attempted party advantages" and consider the problem before them as a business proposition.

"Tax levies must be paid regardless of party affiliation," he stated. "Both political parties promised the people of Nebraska tax reduction, and these promises should be sacredly kept," he said.

"I have endeavored to submit a budget on which all members could agree and pass without delay. I believe I am speaking the overwhelming sentiment of the people when I again urge that this be done."

"Logrolling or vote trading on appropriations should not be countenanced. Such acts should be made a felony. Appropriations that are not of state-wide importance and contain sufficient merit to be approved when voted upon separately should not be hooked up with unnecessary appropriations. Pork barrel state-ments should not be permitted to get a foothold in Nebraska legislative halls."

**Metcalfe Presides.**  
The legislature convened in special session at 11 a. m.

Lieutenant Governor Ted Metcalfe presided in the senate and Speaker Max Kieser in the house. Only two senators were absent at roll call—Senator K. S. Wherry of Pawnee City and Senator C. J. Warner of Waverly. Both were expected later in the day.

Five representatives failed to answer roll call in the house but all were expected to arrive later. They are: Fred Keller of Eustis; Obed Raush of Norfolk; Paul Bruvelet of Stanton; Ira G. Forell of Chester, and John Havelock of Hooper.

The house adopted a motion relating to the present legislative organization, including the speaker, and a contest then started on the motion of Representative Tremore Cone of Valley to make a majority vote sufficient to change the rules of the house instead of a three-fifths majority vote as is now necessary.

The first skirmish resulted in a victory for the house democrats, on a motion by Representative Cone to permit change or suspension of any house rules by a majority vote. Hereafter, it has taken a three-fifths vote to do this.

This, the democrats say, will block any effort to put Governor Bryan's budget recommendations in the hands of a republican controlled committee for consideration, instead of throwing the budget bills on the floor of the house for consideration.

The vote on Cone's motion was 51 to 42.—World-Herald.

## War on Gangland is Taking Shape from Two Sides

**State and Fed! Governments Unite in Effort to Teach Lesson to Gangsters.**

New York—After months of preliminary training, state and federal governments are teaching gangsters and racketeers a new definition of "heat." Even the "big shots" who considered themselves immune to the ordinary annoyance of law are to get a schooling. Within a week vigorous thrusts have been directed against the two most notorious figures in gangdom—"Scarface Al" Capone in Chicago and Jack "Legs" Diamond in New York. The lesser lights are having their troubles in proportion.

Al Capone, first among Chicago's public enemies, was indicted by a federal grand jury for willful evasion of federal income taxes amounting to more than \$200,000. He posted a \$50,000 bond and must face trial for a felony which at the maximum, can bring a five year sentence in the penitentiary and a fine of \$10,000.

The troubles of "Legs" Diamond have been multiplying for more than a month, ever since the driver of a cider wagon limped into Catskill, N. Y., and complained that he had been tortured by a gang of hoodlums.

His "country home" is far from Catskill, was hauled upon a charge of assault. But even before the court had disposed of that charge he was peppered with shot at a roadhouse. He had not fully recovered when a federal grand jury indicted him and a handful of his thugs for conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws. At Albany Friday counsel for Diamond complained that the state was trying to "railroad" him. The trial is set for June 15. Meantime federal agents are investigating Diamond's income.

Rhode Island furnishes a sensation of its own during the week. One James Lavalie, described as the "biggest liquor dealer in New England," was convicted at Providence for failure to pay his income tax. His income ran into millions, and he blandly testified that for more than a year he kept \$500,000 tucked away in his office safe.

The less spectacular characters are also discovering that depositing large sums in a bank is a hazardous occupation. In New York, Enrico Miro, a Porto Rican, who made millions in the "policy racket" in Harlem is under indictment for failure to pay an income tax. So, too, is Emanuel "Mannie" Kessler, who has already served time in the penitentiary at Atlanta.

Several of Al Capone's confederates in Chicago have found bank ac-

counts to be bad business. First, Ralph Capone, brother of Al, was sentenced for tax frauds. Then Frank Nitti and Jack Guzik, were sent up for similar offenses. Today at Leavenworth, Sam Guzik, brother of Jack, began a sentence of eighteen months because he didn't watch his accounts.

## Earth Tremors Felt in Parts of Europe

**Severe in Places, But Without Loss of Life or Heavy Damage Done to Property.**

London—Severe earth tremors in England, France, Norway and Belgium early Sunday greatly alarmed inhabitants, but did little material damage and caused no loss of life. At many points persons jumped from their beds and rushed to the streets half clad. They remained outside for some time, talking excitedly about the disturbance. The tremors were felt thruout England, and in part of Scotland, Wales, the channel islands and the Isle of Wight. Northern France and southern Norway were affected.

J. J. Shaw, seismologist at the West Bromwich observatory, said the shock, which started there at 1:25 a. m., was one of the severest ever recorded in England. He reported that the tremors continued strong for from five to seven minutes and then gradually diminished. They were particularly strong in the Midlands. The phenomenon was accomplished in some regions by rumbling noises and in other places was preceded by a severe thunderstorm. An oppressive calm was noted elsewhere.

Many chimneys crashed to the ground and buildings were felt to sway. Furniture was moved in strange fashions and crockery was thrown to the floor.

Night workers said the ground was felt to move gently. The floors of newspaper offices in Fleet street moved distinctly and tables shook for nearly a minute and then all was quiet.

The pier master at Southern-on-Sea, at the mouth of the Thames in Essex, reported that he was awakened by being thrown from his bed. He said he hurried outside and saw the

sea in an upheaval and boats bobbing about in a turmoil.—State Journal.

## SIX KILLED IN A COLLISION

Wichita Falls, Tex.—Six persons, one a fourteen year old boy, were killed in a collision of a heavy freight truck and a passenger motor car at Smith creek bridge near Bellevue. The dead were: M. Mitcham, Wichita Falls grocer; Sam McNew, Wichita Falls bakery employe; Bill Orman, Wichita Falls garage man; Murphy Deshong, Amarillo, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Deshong, owners of the truck; V. J. Nottley, Dallas, substitute driver of the truck, and Leonidas Lawler, Vernon, Orman, the only victim found alive after the crash, succumbed to a fractured skull shortly after 8 o'clock.

## MRS. DOUGLAS SHEARER KILLS SELF AT PIER

Los Angeles, June 6.—Mrs. Douglas Shearer, sister-in-law of Norma Shearer, motion picture star, and wife of a prominent sound engineer, committed suicide with a rented target pistol at a Venice pier shooting gallery Saturday.

## STRONG DEFENSE PLANNED

Eagle River, Wis.—A bitter fight for acquittal was contemplated by George W. E. Perry, principal of six bigamous marriages, who was held without bail in the Vilas county jail for trial in circuit court on a charge of slaying Cora Belle Hackett, his third "wife." Perry waived preliminary hearing when arraigned and was bound over to the October term of court. The proceedings, climaxing his return under guard from San Francisco, were brief.

"I'm not guilty, I'll fight to the finish and I'll be acquitted, too. But I want a long delay because there's some things my lawyer will have to look up," Perry said.

Altho freely admitting bigamy, Perry denied he was guilty of shooting Mrs. Hackett, moderately wealthy Illinois widow with whom he "honeymooned" at the H. W. Parker resort near here last summer.
