Seek to Check Bathing in Horse-shoe Lake

Watering Place Near Louisville Placarded With Signs to Check Bathing in Lake

The fact that several have met their death in Horse-shoe lake near Louisville already this season, has led the residents of that section to take steps to try and prevent the repetition of the tragedies that have marked the lake.

Signs have been placed all around the lake to warn the bathers and heading parties of the danger and urging them to take care in entering the waters of the lake unless they are experienced swimmers and able to extricate themselves from the water.

One boy from Omaha met his death while wading in the lake and getting into a deep hole where he was unable to swim out and was drowned before help could reach him and the second that of Mrs. Frank Ranard of Omaha who was in a boating party and when the boat overturned was thrown out and met death in the waters of the lake.

The lake is one of the most attractive in this part of the state and many attractive cottages are located there and occupied by Louisville people in the summer season, and the spot is also a favorite outing spot for Omaha residents and who recklessly enter the lake regardless of whether they are experienced swimmers or not.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

The subject of the Lesson-Sermon read at all Christian Science churches and services on Sunday, June 21, was "Is the Universe, Including Man, Evolved from Atomic Force?" The object of the lesson is to show that, on the theory that God, divine Spirit, is the only cause, there can be no creative quality or force in any form of matter; that it is false belief which attributes to matter a power it does not possess, and which fails properly to understand the self-existent divine Mind or Creator. One citation read from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy (p. 189), is as follows: "The human mind, by an inevitable perversion, makes all things start from the lowest instead of from the highest mortal thought. The reverse is the case with all the formations of the immortal divine Mind. They proceed with the divine source; and so, in tracing them, we constantly ascend in infinite being." A part of one Biblical selection read is as follows: "It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing." (John 6: 63).

AMMONIA GAS CAUSES DEATH

Lincoln, June 23.—Henry Pfeiff, 70, Lincoln merchant, died of a heart attack after he was gassed by ammonia in the basement of the Pfeiff market Tuesday.

Mr. Pfeiff and a clerk, Albert P. Kroeller, were engaged in recharging the refrigerating plant. They were tightening a valve cap when the valve fell out. Mr. Pfeiff received the full charge of ammonia in the face, Kroeller said.

The merchant fainted, his head striking a piece of machinery. Kroeller inhaled a quantity of the gas before he and William Frazier could carry the unconscious man from the basement.

Mr. Pfeiff was born in Germany and came to the United States when 5 years ago. Forty-four years ago he built the store building and had operated the market there since.

Morehead Opposes Hoover Debt Plan

Declares It Is First Step in Direction of Cancellation—Of Little Benefit to Citizens

Falls City, Neb., June 23.—Opposition to the war debt moratorium proposed by President Hoover was declared here today by Congressman John H. Morehead, (dem.) in a public statement.

His statement follows: "I am opposed to the cancellation of the war debts owed us by the European nations. In my judgment the moratorium is the first step with that object in view.

"We undoubtedly owe the average American citizen something. The reduction of the debt by congress was a tremendous amount. It was made without my consent or vote. "I am not for oppression, and if emergency demands I would extend the time for payment, but it is a just debt and it should be paid.

"In my opinion this is more to boost the price of foreign stocks and bonds of which the speculators have vast holdings. The visit of the secretary of the treasury was to bring about the moratorium and it has had its effect on foreign stocks and bonds, but it will be of little benefit to the average American citizen and no doubt will necessitate the extending of the income tax to American citizens of small incomes in order to meet running expenses of the government. Billions and billions of increased governmental expenditures of the United States shows too much liberality by public officials of the taxpayers money.

"If appropriations are made the people must pay it. So many believe money paid by the government does not cost any one anything, hence the contemplated action of the United States may be very popular. If debt is cancelled the American citizen's make it up by paying it directly or indirectly.

Sydney W. Pascall of London was elected by unanimous ballot as president of Rotary International for the coming year.

After applause for the government, short speeches of welcome were delivered by members of the Rotary. President Roth responded.
