Mr. Hosterman divides the stacks into three types according to the C. M. Andrus in Manley, where all general shapes. One type of stack he calls square, flat-topped stack, another a high, round-topped stack, to Omaha on Sunday to visit with and the other, a low, round-topped

To obtain in cubic feet the volume of a square-topped stack, Mr. Hosterman measures the distance from the ground on one side over the top of the stack to the ground on the other side. The then subtracts fiftyfive hundredths of the width from fifty-sixth hundredth of the over measurement, and multiplies the result by the width and length of the stack. The figure obtained is the number of cubic feet in the stack.

To determine the volume of high, round-topped- stack, Hosterman uses the same general method but substitutes forty-six hundredths of the width and fifty-two hundredths of the over-measurement for the corresponding figures given above Low, round-topped stacks are estimated in the same way as high round-topped stacks except that forty-four hundredths of the width replaces the corresponding figure in the previous statement.

After obtaining the number of cubic feet in the stack, it is necessary to figure the number of cubic feet per ton of hay. This depends upon the kind of hay and the length of time it has been stacked. Railroads Request State Rates Boost

Ask State Commission to Grant Whatever Increase Approved by Federal Body

The railroads doing business in Nebraska filed with the state railway commission Tuesday an applilast February after attempting to cation for an increase of intrastate rates if and when the Interstate commission acts on the application recently filed with the latter, asking for a 15 percent boost in all schedules. Thte companies maintain that tions there exists a serious impairment of financial resources and lack of capacity to render efficient and adequate service.

It is pointed out that the conditions set forth in their application to the federal body apply equally to intrastate rates as well as interstate schedules, and that an advance is both necessary to afford the minimum measure of relief needed in the present emergency. It is set out that it will be necessary for the state commission to harmonipe and conform rates for shipments within the Supreme Court Ruling in Cases Like state to the interstate rates as they will be fixed by the interstate commerce commision, in order to prevent discrimination against commerce moving between the states and to distribute equally the increases between the states.
