War Risk Insurance Claims Given Full Priority

Have Priority in Failed Banks in Ruling

In two cases decided Friday the supreme court held that where war risk insurance is paid by the United States to the guardian of an incompetent veteran or to the widow of such veteran the money belongs to the United States and is subject to its control until it reaches the beneficiary designated according to law. In such a case the guardian is the agent for the government and his authority over the fund is limited and controlled by federal statutes alone Justice Day wrote both opinions.

One case was from Pawnee county where D. W. Osborn, guardian for Frank M. Tannyhill, had nearly \$9, 000 of money paid by the govern ment on war risk insurance on de posit in the First State bank of Pawnee when it failed. The statutes are cited to show that a guardian must make reports to the commissioner of pensions and it is held that the money has not passed into the hands of the pensioner altho paid to his guardian, and that as long as the fund remains subject to the control and jurisdiction of the United States the state has o right to impair or control it. The ongress has passed is to see that he beneficiaries are granted the exlusive use and benefit of the money

dopt any method which it deemed pest in seeing that this purpose is carried out, and it has taken measres to protect it from creditors and other ways to protect him from imself as well as others. In the Creighton case it is held that the money is not an asset of the estate. he receiver being a mere trustee to eceive and distribute the money to the persons designated by congress o receive it. They get the money not as heirs but as designated beneficiaries. It is government money until it reached them thru the channels designated to reach the dependents of the veteran.

Justice Day says that the payment was intended to discharge in a measure a moral obligation to the veterans, not in the sense that it was gratutity, but it did give the soldier an opportunity to contract with the United States for the benefit of himself and his dependents.




