During the past few weeks the past few weeks John Maurer sickened and died on July 17th, at the home, the funeral being held from the South German Lutheran church of Eagle on July 19th, the interment being held at what is known as Pleasant Ridge cemetery north of Eagle near where their farm is located. The funeral was in charge of the W. L. Hobson and Son funeral home of Weeping Water. The department being held at the home which he and the brother maintained for many years. His influence for good will be missed in the community. He leaves to mourn his demise his brother, George Maurer.
