**Three Months
in Jail is Given
Chicken Thief**

**William Dineen Pleads Guilty and
Receives Sentence of Three
Months in Jail.**

William Dineen, arrested several weeks ago at Blair in connection with the theft of chickens from the Sent farm near Murray and the S. A. Wiles farm south of this city, will have to serve a sentence of three months in jail, Judge James T. Begley decided Friday in the district court.
Dineen on arraignment in the county court entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of chicken stealing and waived the preliminary hearing, he being taken Friday before the district court. In the higher court Mr. Dineen decided to change his plea and when arraigned before Judge Begley he pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced to the county jail for a term of three months.
The young man named Dalton, who was arrested with Dineen on the same charge, was dismissed and turned loose as there was no evidence to connect him with the chicken stealing.

DEATH OF JERGEN SCHROEDER

The death of Jergen Schroeder, old and highly respected resident of Cedar Creek, occurred last night at the Methodist hospital at Omaha where he has been for the past week taking treatment and under observation. Mr. Schroeder has been in failing health for some time, his condition becoming such that it was decided best to have him taken to the hospital and where he passed away.
Jergen Petersen Schroeder was born September 6, 1860, in Schleswig-Holstein, Denmark, coming to America at the age of twenty-one years in 1881. Mr. Schroeder first settled at Sheffield, Iowa, where he was married on October 7, 1883, to Miss Dorothy Marie Bertelsen. The family moved to Omaha in 1891, they residing there and at Bellevue, moving to Cedar Creek in 1902, where they have since resided. Mrs. Schroeder preceded her husband in death, passing away January 13, 1931, as well as two daughters, Anna, dying in girlhood, and Mrs. Christina Keil, December 21, 1930. The surviving children are P. J. Schroeder, Omaha; G. P. Schroeder, H. J. Schroeder and Mrs. Chris True, Cedar Creek.
