Washington.-Misuse of public funds was charged against Secretary Hyde in the senate by Robinson of Arkansas. In a thundering voice, he asserted the secretary of agriculture

The democratic leader said the Hyde statement had been sent out "presumably" as part of the department's "market news service" and he demanded to know "just what refor partisan political purposes, and it cannot be justified when done by anyone, no matter whether he be a 1w democrat or a republican." abase within Republicans made no reply to the Robinson attack. It biimaxed an earlier political sertie in a dighter vein by Senator Harrison of Mississippi, who called attention to the third anniversary of President Hoover's inauguration. Harrison, too, challenged republicans to review the three years of Hoover. Senator Fess of Chio, the chairman of the republican national committee, alone sparred with the Mississippian. He recalled the economy speech Thursday by Harrison, and a subsequent vote of the latter to add funds to the agriculture supply bill and said his remarks should not be heeded.

Harrison said the theme song of the Hoover administration was 'We're Ferever Blowing Bubbles." He said the 1928 campaign had been known as a "whispering campaign," but before November it would be a "weeping campaign."
