

Omaha Boys are Arrested at Union Today

Four Youths Held Here on Charges
of Robbing Caboose of Mis-
souri Pacific Train.

From Wednesday's Daily
Sheriff Ed Thimman and Deputy
Sheriff Ray Becker were called to
Union this morning at 4 o'clock

where four Omaha boys were being
held on charges of having robbed a
caboose of a Missouri Pacific freight
train.
The four boys were charged with
having broken the seals on several
freight cars in the Atchison, Kan-
sas, yards and also with having tak-
en an overcoat and an electric lan-
tern from the caboose of a train
while it was standing in the yards
in the Kansas town. The overcoat
and lantern were found in the car
from which the four boys were taken
at Union.
The four gave the names of J. D.
Harris, 1613 Manderson street, Lee
Kembler, 2010 Emmett street,
Charles Riggs, 2118 Ames avenue
and Irvin Olson, 1614 Manderson
street, Omaha. They range from
thirteen to fourteen years of age.
The boys state that they had left

Omaha Monday night on a freight
and had gone as far as Atchison
where they spent Tuesday and had
then decided to bum their way back
home to Omaha. They denied the
fact that they had broken into the
caboose or any of the cars as was
claimed.
Jack Kennedy and Sam Simmons,
of Grand Junction, Colorado, were
also taken from the train and are
held for investigation at the county
jail here.
Special agents of the Missouri
Pacific are expected here Thursday
to look into the case and assist in
the examination of the parties sus-
pected of having robbed the train.

Rev. Salsbury Drops Dead at Wood River

Former Pastor of First Presbyterian
Church Stricken with a Sudden
Heart Attack.

Rev. J. H. Salsbury, 64, former
pastor of the First Presbyterian
church of this city, died very sud-
denly Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 at
Wood River, Nebraska, where he had
been for several years in the pastor-
ate of the church.
The death brings a great regret to
the many friends here, the pastor
having been a very popular resident
of the city while he was here in

charge of the Presbyterian church
from 1905 to 1908.
Rev. Salsbury was here several
months ago to visit and renew the
acquaintances of many years ago.
It was during his pastorate of the
Presbyterian church that the debt
on the church that had been in exist-
ence since the building of the church
in the early nineties, was wiped out
and the occasion made a jubilee for
the church and its membership.
He is survived by the widow and
one son, Russell Salsbury, who re-
sides at Kansas City, Missouri.
Rev. Salsbury was a graduate of
Park college of Parkville, Missouri,
in the class of 1896 and later studied
at the theological seminary at Au-
burn, New York. He had charges at
Gresham, Benedict, organized the
church at Fair and was at the Third
church of Lincoln when coming

here in 1905. After leaving this city
he has held charges at Auburn,
Aurora, Loup City, Lyons, Cozad and
Wood River. He was state president
of the Christian Endeavor in 1905.
