brary.

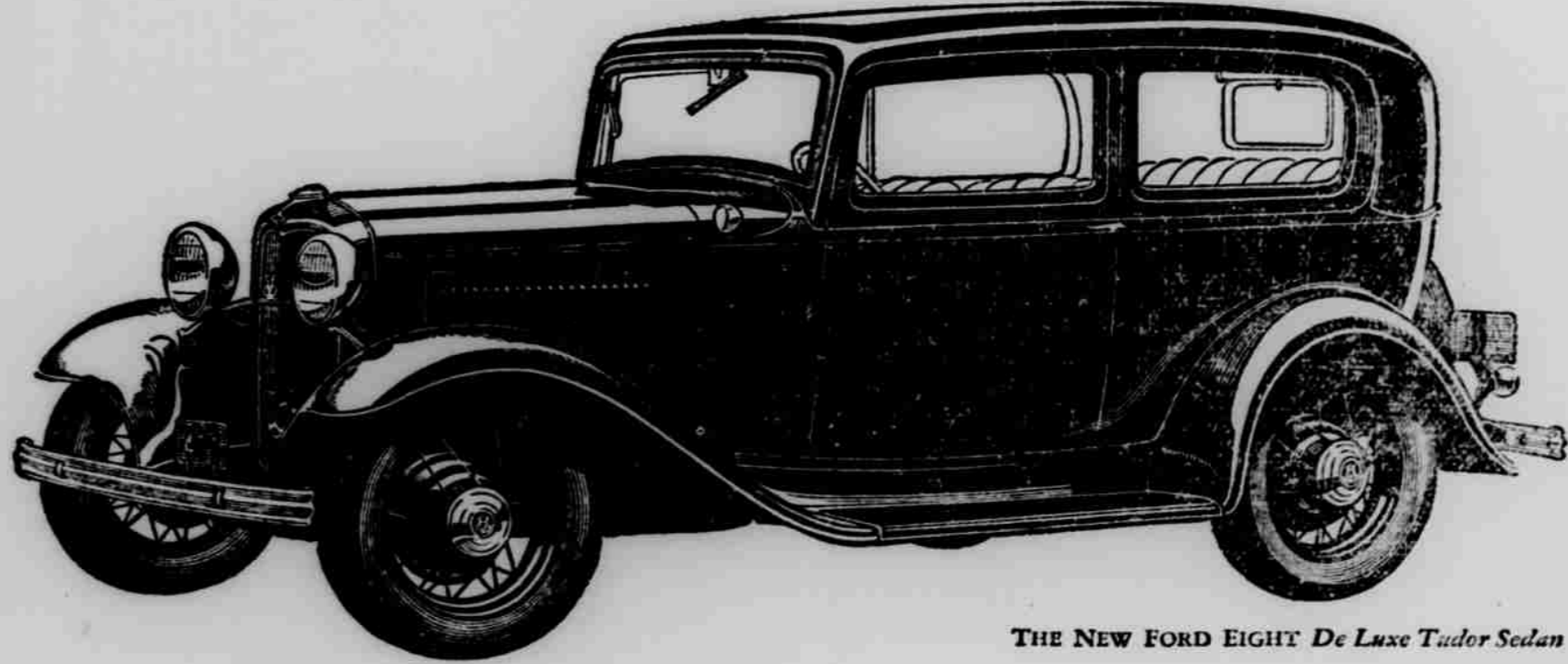
The two high school girls present
