Pasturing Sweet Clover.

One of the greatest difficulties in pasturing sweet clover is to keep it pastured down sufficiently to make it palatable over a long season. Farmers have resorted to two methods n trying to get around the difficulty. One is to use a temporary fence and run the livestock on only a limited acreage so they will keep the sweet method is to mow the sweet clover whenever it outgrows the livestock. Unlike alfalfa, sweet clover does not send up new shoots from the crown during the second summer of its Anne Ruffner, Helen Louise Blotzer, growth. In a thick stand of second year sweet clover the buds on the stubble have been smothered out near the ground. In order not to kill the sweet clover by mowing, it may be necessary to raise the sickle bar on special shoes and cut the sweet clover high.

Even under the best of managenent second year sweet clover will not furnish much good pasture after the middle of July. Nebraska farmers have tried using a combination of first year and second year sweet clover or a combination of sweet lover and sudan grass to supply the stock with continuous temporary pasture through the summer months.
