COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CO-OPERATE ON FALL SHOW

At last night's Legion meeting, Commander Distell named a committee to co-operate with the Retail Section, Chamber of Commerce, at a proposed fall festival or homecoming celebration, the plans of which are to be worked out within the next few weeks. The members of the committee are Henry Soennichsen, chairman; Leslie Niel, Leo Boynton, Geo. Petring, W. R. Holly, W. G. Kieck, Frank Rehal, Jas. Farnham, John Turner and Commander Distell.

It was voted to have two leaders appointed at each Legion meeting to conduct a 10 minute explanation and round table discussion of successive chapters of the new booklet "Rights and Benefits of Ex-Service Men" to be issued next month by national headquarters, and for the August meeting Service Officer Duxbury and J. A. Capwell were named as leaders. A committee to consider plans for a Washington Bi-Centennial observance of Armistice day was named, as follows: Dr. G. L. Taylor, chairman; Frank Smith, W. G. Kieck, Dr. P. T. Heineman, E. O. Vroman and Roy Holly.

Selection of delegates to the state convention at Norfolk was deferred until the August meeting, Thursday night, August 4th. A request from Kearney for support in their quest of the 1933 state convention was also carried over to the August meeting. Approval of the purchase of two billboard posters to be displayed on local outdoor billboards for thirty days, beginning October 15th, was voted, the only expense being the purchase of the posters. The Missouri Valley advertising concern of Falls City, owner of local billboards each year gives space of two of its boards here to such posters, also looking after putting them up. The cost of the lithographs is \$1 each.

STATE GASOLINE EXEMPT

State, county and municipal units of government are not taxable under the new federal tax for gasoline purchased for use for governmental purposes, in the opinion of Attorney General Sorenson.

Sorenson expressed his opinion in reply to an inquiry from J. W. Billeter, highway commissioner of Cheyenne county. Billeter explained that Cheyenne county buys several carloads of gasoline annually for highway development purposes, and asked if the county would be required to pay the new one cent federal tax on such gasoline.

The attorney general stated that the supreme court has held, in similar cases, that:

"The principle that the instrumentalities and means of operations whereby the states exert their governmental powers are exempt from taxation by the United States, is not affected by the amount of the particular tax or the resulting interference, but is absolute."

Sorenson quoted the United States Daily of July 2, which said the bureau of international revenue has announced orally that it is not taxing gasoline sold cities and states by manufacturers if the gasoline is used for governmental purposes.

DEATH OF ARTHUR C. STEM

The announcement of the death Wednesday night at Chadron, Nebraska, of Arthur C. Stem, 72, grand high priest of the grand chapter of the Royal Arch Masons of Nebraska. Mr. Stem died of injuries received in an automobile accident Tuesday night while he was driving from Harrison to his home at Chadron.

Mr. Stem was well known in Plattsmouth where he had been a frequent visitor at the Nebraska Masonic Home, being a member of the board of control, and as well had a large acquaintance among the Masons of the state. He was grand commander of the Knights Templar of Nebraska in 1922.

The deceased was formerly engaged by the Northwestern railroad in northwest Nebraska, but retired several years ago.
