The attendants at the court, however, were doomed to disappointment, as William Lovely, of Omaha, attorney for the defense, secured a continuance of the case until Thursday, September 1st, in order that he might look farther into the case and the evidence.

This case is one in which Mr. Whitely was arrested in the vicinity of Murray after a pursuit by officers and it was claimed by the officers that several bottles of whiskey were thrown from the car during the pursuit. The defendant has plead not guilty to the charge.
